MR. GERARD CALLED UPON TO EXPLAIN

Alleged to Have Spoken of Cordial
Relations Between the U. S.
And Germany.

Washington, Jan. 8.—The report by
the Overseas News Agency that Am-
bassador Gerard at a public welcome
back to Germany had said that "Never
since the beginning of the war have
the relations between the United States
and Germany been so cordial as now"
were inquired into today by the State
Department, through a cable to the
ambassador personally.

Officials, in making this announce-
ment, refused to add any further com-
ment except that they wished to know
exactly what he had said. The action
of the department was interpreted as
evidence of the importance of the pos-
sible effect of such an utterance, as-
pecially upon public opinion in the Al-
lied countries, where published reports
have shown an impression that the
President's note was in some way con-
nected with the Central Powers' peace
proposals. Every effort has been made
to dispel this.

As a result, the department was
prompt in making public its inquiry to
the Ambassador and probably will give
out his reply when received.

It is indicated also that the report as
quoted did not convey a true view of
German-American relations, which have
commonly been described as strained
through the recent submarine activi-
ties.

STRANGE INCIDENT IN A TRENCH RAID

Enemy Third Line Trenches Were
Entered by the British Without
Opposition.

New York, Jan. 8.—A News Agency
despatch received today says:

British Army Headquarters in France
Jan. 8.—One of the strangest incidents
of the war was the Scotch-English raid
southeast of Arras on Saturday.

First, second and third line German
trenches were entered almost unop-
posed, the stormers declared. Despite
"S.O.S." flares the Germans did not re-
ceive reinforcements or artillery aid,
therefore those in the trenches sudden-
ly disappeared in the dugouts, which
the British bombed and blew up along
the 2,000 yards of front involved.

A Scottish officer who participated
in the raid, declared he did not see a
single German, and did not hear a
single machine gun nor a sniper's rifle.
although he sat on the parapet of an
enemy third line trench, smoking a ci-
garette, and strolled leisurely back to
his own trenches. The raid followed a
five-hour smashing bombardment,
and was executed under cover of a
smoke as well as shell fire barrage.

Officers of the Portuguese expedi-
tionary force have arrived here pre-
paratory to fighting on the western
front, and are talking enthusiastically
of their new problem.

Authorization to cable this news was
given for the first time today. The
presence of Portuguese officers on the
French front marks the beginning of
Portugals actual participation in the
fighting.

NOTED EXPLORER HAS PASSED AWAY

Wrangel, Alaska, Jan. 8.—John Fin-
layson, an explorer, for whom Finlay-
son river and Finlayson lake, in the
Yukon territory, were named, died to-
day aged 105 years. Finlayson was a
native of Scotland. He prospected and
mined gold in California and Oregon
until he was 66 years old, and then
went to British Columbia and the Yu-
kon territory, where he explored large
areas into which white men had never
penetrated.

LIBERAL GOVERNMENT WAS EXONERATED

No Evidence That Any Member of the
Government Had Any Knowledge
of the Frauds.

Regina, Sask., Jan. 6.—The Sas-
katchewan government is completely
exonerated of any guilty knowledge of
wrongdoing in connection with the
road frauds in the province in an in-
terim report of the Wetmore Royal
Commission, just made to the Lieuten-
ant Governor-in-Council. The report
finds that there is no evidence to es-
tablish that any member of the gov-
ernment had any knowledge of the
frauds.

Mr. J. E. Bradshaw, M. L. A. for the
county of Prince Albert, charged at the
last session of the legislature that dur-
ing the years 1913-14-15 the province
had been defrauded of some \$50,000 on
account of road work that had never
been done. Following an inquiry by
the public accounts committee, a royal
commission was appointed, consisting
of ex-Chief Justice Wetmore, H. G.
Smith, of Regina, and G. D. MacKie,
of Moosejaw, to conduct an investiga-
tion into the whole matter.

No evidence was adduced to show
that the moneys realized by fraud
were used for party or election pur-
poses.

Amount of Frauds.

It is stated that the total amount of
the frauds perpetrated by G. P. Brown,
chief clerk of the Highway Depart-
ment, and E. H. Devline, M. L. A., was
\$11,469.24. The total amounts of the
other Brown frauds with which the
names of J. F. Lindsay, of Swift Cur-
rent, and E. L. H. Smith, manager of
the Broad street branch of the Bank
of Ottawa, Regina, were connected,
was \$52,924.13. Other road frauds
carried out by Simpson, a junior clerk
in the Highway Department, and God-
frey, a road foreman, totalled \$2,252.80.
The frauds perpetrated by Brown were
based upon forgeries—forged contracts
and pay lists, forged engineers' certi-
ficates, forged endorsements on cheques
and forged signatures of the three offi-
cials who acted from time to time as
chairmen of the highways department.
