ACCORDING TO CABLE

Pte. Walter Styrán, His Brother, Sends Word From England---Pte. George De Long Invalided Home With Pneumonia.

A cablegram from Private Walter Styrán, who is in England, to his mother, Mrs. George H. Styrán, of Brunswick street, was received last night and contained the information that the brother of the sender, Private Thomas E. Styrán, was a prisoner in Germany. Official confirmation of this is expected shortly.

Private Thomas E. Styrán was reported from Ottawa on Dec. 27th as missing. He had served in France in a battalion originally from Edmonton, since October. Private Styrán first enlisted in the Composite Battalion at Halifax, and from that was transferred into the 104th Battalion. From the latter he was drafted to France. His father, Pioneer George H. Styrán, is in England with the 5th Pioneer Battalion and a half-brother, Lieut. William H. Buswell, is with the Canadian Army Medical Corps in France.

Invalided Home. Private George De Long, of this city, who left with the 140th Battalion, arrived at St. John yesterday. He was stricken with pneumonia in England and was invalided home.

Native of Fredericton. Lieut. C. L. Steet, of the 1st C. M. R., formerly of the 77th Battalion, Ottawa, also arrived at St. John yesterday. He is a native of Fredericton.

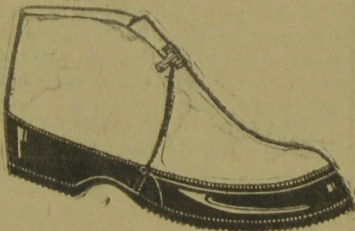
