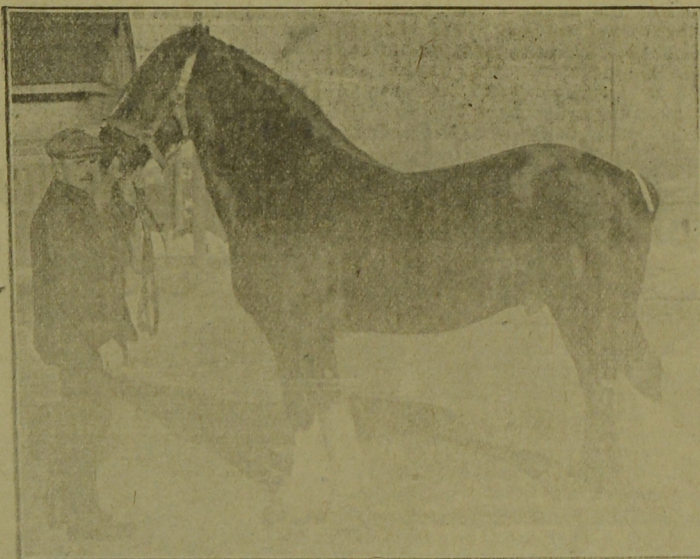

### FAVORITES WON AT CLEVELAND ON THURSDAY

Mable Trask Put the Trotting Mark for the Season at 2.05 1/4 on Her First Appearance.

Cleveland, O., July 19. — Three favorites won at today's Grand Circuit meeting, and the competition was so keen that the trotters and pacers were forced to extend themselves.

A new season's trotting mark of 2.05 1/4 was set by Mable Trask, who made her first appearance of the year in the first trotting of the Jack Pot stakes. In addition Adloo Guy, winning the 2.08 mile, covered a mile in 2.03 1-3, establishing himself as the season's fastest pacer. Mabel Trask was given hot competition in the Jack Pot stake by St. Frisco, the latter at most nosing her out in the first heat. Zomrect was a good third and showed surprising form.

Murphy upset the predictions by driving Royal Mac, in the second choice to the front in the Tavern "Steak." W. J. Leeburn, the favorite, trailed in third. Adloo Guy, former champion of the half mile rings, and The Savoy, both equal favorites, put up a game fight in the 2.08 pace. Peter the Great surprised by taking the first heat, but after that Adloo Guy went to the front.

In the second division of the Faisig sweepstake Harvest Time romped away from Trujolla, the favorite. John R.
