

LATE LORD KITCHENER WAS FAVORABLE

Commission Finds That He Approved
of the Dardanelles Campaign---
Churchill Took Initiative

London, March 8.—The majority report of the commission appointed last July to investigate the Dardanelles campaign, which was held up for a fortnight by the decision to expurgate certain sections referring to allied countries, was made public this morning in its revised form. The commission reports that the late Lord Kitchener, then War Secretary, favored the project and that when he gave a decision in the War Council it was invariably accepted as final. The despatch of troops to the east was delayed three weeks, the report says, as the result of a decision of Lord Kitchener, which was not communicated to the then First Lord of the Admiralty, Winston Spencer Churchill.

The project was undertaken on the initiative of Col. Churchill.

The commission reports that naval advisers would have preferred a joint military and naval attack, instead of the attack by the fleet alone, and declares that these views should have been heartily by the war council, which was not justified in coming to the decision without a much fuller opinion. The possibility of making a surprise attack by land and water offered such great military and political advantages, the commission finds that it was ill-advised to sacrifice this possibility by deciding hastily to undertake a purely naval attack, which from its nature could not attain completely the objects desired. The subject has been a difficult one, the commission reports, on which to reach definite conclusions.

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MEN WANTED FOR FORESTRY WORK

Another Call to Canadian Woodsmen
To go Overseas---5000 Already
There

Ottawa, March 8.—Prohibition of the import of timber into Great Britain will necessitate increased domestic production in the United Kingdom, and as a result of this a call has come for five thousand more Canadians for forestry work. The men will go over to supplement the five thousand who already have crossed in forestry battalions.

Experience in lumbering is necessary, but the medical tests are relaxed somewhat and the age limit is raised to 48. Flat footed men are eligible. As the men are to go in drafts rather than by battalions, officers will not be needed.

Recruiting will be carried on at Montreal, Ottawa, Renfrew, Brockville, Toronto, North Bay, Haileybury, Sudbury, Port Arthur, Sussex, N.B., and Halifax.

The breaking up of the lumbering camps, it is thought, will easily provide the number required.

WOMAN M. P.'S NOT WANTED IN ONTARIO

Toronto, March 8.—On the motion of Premier Hearst in the Legislature last night, N. W. Rowell's bill to remove the disqualification of women as candidates for the Legislature, was given the six months hoist.

Premier Hearst declared it was neither necessary nor advisable, and that it had not been asked for by a single woman in the province. It would be better to wait until the opinion of the public and the attitude of women could be ascertained. He was sure the women would prefer to advance surely rather than swiftly.

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NO EMBARGO ON EXPORT OF POTATOES

Ottawa, March 9.—An official statement given out by the acting Prime Minister, Sir George E. Foster, today, disposes of the story that an embargo will be placed on the exportation of potatoes from Canada.

The statement says: "Information gathered from official and unofficial sources from all parts of Canada indicates a substantial surplus of potatoes over and above seed and food requirements. Under these circumstances the government does not think at present an embargo is justified."
