J. BARLEYCORN
IS RESURRECTED

Washington, July 12.—"Mr. John
Barleycorn" is coming to life again as
a prominent figure in Senate debate on
food control. After having been bur-
ied with ceremony by a substantial
Senate majority last Saturday, whis-
key revived under the strenuous first
aid services of "drys" who believe his
burial was unconstitutional.

The centre of fire in the debate is

dent Wilson to buy all goods in bond.
It appears likely now there will be re-
consideration of last Saturday's ac-
tion.

Hard liquor prices are soaring as a
result of the Senate confusion. Deal-
ers who see whiskey and gin vanish-
ing or curtailed are laying in extra
stocks, thus forcing up the price, while
the prospective drought is an excuse
for boosting prices.

Here whiskey is 15 cents "straight,"
while by the case there is an advance
of \$1.50 or more since last week.

Scotch is up as high as 30 cents a
drink. Gin, sold two weeks ago at \$11
a case, now commands \$18, while beer
is sharing in the ballooning at the rate
of about \$1 a barrel.

AMERICAN
VESSELS LOST

Washington, July 13.—Official des-
patches today announced the sinking
by a submarine of the American bark
Hildegard, of New Orleans, on July 10,
and of the American schooner Mary
W. Bowen, of Fall River, on June 8.
All members of both crews were res-
cued and landed. The Hildegard was
a vessel of 595 tons and the schooner
a five master of 1,907 tons.

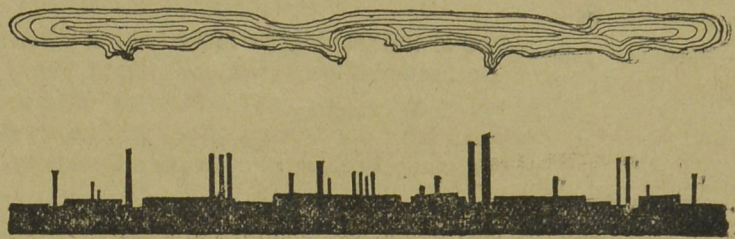
