SHELL ORDERS OF \$50,000,000

Montreal, Nov. 5.—The Gazette says it is understood that H. J. Fuller, of the Canadian Fairbanks-Morse Co., is to have charge of the New York end of the new business, and shell orders which Canadian manufacturers expect to receive from the United States to the amount of about \$50,000,000.

S. A. CONGRESS AT TORONTO



(Continued from page 2.) ness government placed in control." Patronage meant inefficiency, the squandering of public money for the purpose of getting votes. "That is going to be changed," declared Mr. Carvell, very emphatically, "and in the Public Works Department no jobs will be given and no contracts awarded except after public tender." (Applause.)

Stop Unnecessary Works. Mr. Carvell denied a report that he was going to stop all public work in Canada, but millions of dollars were being expended in unnecessary work in war time, and he proposed to stop that sort of thing. "These works will absolutely cease until the close of the war," he declared.

Then the new Minister made an earnest appeal for money for the Victory Loan, "to carry out our pledges, not to the Empire alone, but to save civilization. Give what you can," he urged, "and if you cannot give \$100, give \$50. I appeal to you to buy these war bonds as a sacred duty which you

NOW A DISTRICT REPRESENTATIVE

Mr. James Bremner, Jr., with Mr. Norbert Legere, as his assistant, has been appointed District Representative of the Agricultural Department for the counties of Northumberland, Gloucester and Restigouche. Mr. Bremner has had a course at the Truro Agricultural College and since he has been actively connected with agricultural work. His early experience was on the farm.

Mr. Legere was recently managing his father's farm at Caraquet. He has just completed a three year course at Ste. Anne de la Pocatiere Agricultural College.

Mr. A. G. Taylor has taken charge of the counties of Carleton, Victoria and Madawaska. His office will be in the Agricultural School at Woodstock. Mr. Taylor has the necessary practical training, the course in agriculture at Truro, besides the benefit of special training in potato work. An assistant will be secured as soon as possible.

A revolution in method or any great forward movement in agriculture is not anticipated as the result of the appointment of district representatives, but it is expected to see as elsewhere that slow, steady, normal agricultural growth in proper lines which is indicative of supervision and proper assistance, which men with early farm experience and a college training can render and which spells success, financially and socially in the rural districts.

These men are going to the farmers to assist in every possible manner, and not at all in a dictatorial fashion but through proper methods of co-operation.

No Tariff Changes Now. "What do you intend to do with the tariff?" shouted a man in the audience.

"We are going to leave it alone till after the war," was Mr. Carvell's ready reply, and it brought down the house. "I want to say," he added, "that there is no man in Canada who has given this tariff question more consideration than I have done and who is more radical than I am. It was no wrench to my convictions," declared the Minister, "to decide that we are not going to change the tariff, save perhaps in some minor instances that may be absolutely necessary, until after the war is over. But after the war I will explain my views

on the tariff, and will explain them in no uncertain tones."

If Canada Fails—In thinking over the difference between his position and that of Sir Wilfrid respecting conscription he always came back to the question. "Suppose the referendum should be defeated, what then? Canada would stand in much the same position as Russia."

A heckler—Where will you stand if the people do not endorse Union government?

Mr. Carvell—If the people do not endorse Union government, then Canada will be in the position I have outlined. It will practically mean that Canada will quit the great cause for which we are fighting. (Applause.)

The Minister, proceeding, said he was not going to argue about the need for men. Everyone knew how badly reinforcements were wanted at the front. They could not get more men voluntarily. True, the voluntary system may not have had a fair chance, but the fact remained that recruiting had stopped.

"Borden stopped it," exclaimed the

same man, who had interrupted the speaker earlier.

Need for Compulsion. "Well, it stopped anyway," commented Mr. Carvell. The compulsory method was the only method now, he added.

"Are there any men claiming exemption?" queried another heckler, amid laughter.

"Yes, there are quite a few," admitted the Minister, "but I will be quite frank with you. The very fact that so many are claiming exemption is one of the greatest reasons which justify the Military Service Act. (Applause.)

"Those views may not make me popular, but they are the views I intend to give everywhere I speak from now until election day. Britain has raised five million men and is saving civilization simply because her statesmen had the nerve and the courage to say to the people, we are up against a condition where we need men and are going to get them." (Applause.)

The United States also had set a splendid example to Canada, declared the Minister, who was given another ovation when he concluded and departed to catch his train for the east.
