DR. McALLISTOR DECLARES FOR UNION GOVERNMENT

Liberal Candidate in Royal, Says That no Other Course is Open to Him--Not Satisfied With Sir Wilfrid's Attitude in the Military Service Act--Is Ready to Place Himself in the Hands of the People

Sussex, Nov. 5.—In a plain, straightforward statement today Dr. D. H. McAllister, who was nominated as the Liberal candidate for Royal last May, announced himself as a supporter of union government.

"The manifesto of Sir Wilfrid Laurier," he said, "published this morning, insofar as it refers to military service, leaves me no other alternative. It is a policy of inaction, delay and uncertainty with respect to providing reinforcements for the brave boys who have voluntarily gone overseas and fought, bled and died for the empire.

"I cannot stand behind any policy that means desertion of the men in the trenches or would bring the blush of shame to Canada, and therefore I will support the union government in all measures that are necessary to give Canada an opportunity of doing her proper share in the great struggle for civilization and the Empire.

"I was in hope that Sir Wilfrid Laurier could have given his old Liberal supporters a chance to stand behind him in support of sending the necessary reinforcements to help the Canadians who are already across the water fighting for those who could not or would not go, but his language is unmistakable—he will not enforce the military service act. He wants a referendum. That means that Canada must wait until after the election; then if Sir Wilfrid is successful, a further delay until parliament meets; then still more delay until an act is passed authorizing a referendum and then how long would we have to wait until the people voted? Nobody knows.

"It is morally certain that with Quebec solid the military service act would be repealed by an adverse referendum vote and then let me ask you where would Canada stand in the eyes of the world?

Our Duty to the Empire.

"We cannot afford to risk losing our lofty place upon the honor roll of the Empire. The splendid renown of Canada won on many battlefields in France and Flanders must not be smirched by any reluctance or unwillingness to 'carry on.'

"Therefore I will support union government. In doing so I must appeal to my friends—the people of Kings and Queens counties, or the constituency of Royal, Conservatives as well as Liberals, to ratify my decision. For this purpose I will ask the people to assemble at an early date when I will place myself in their hands.

"There is no union candidate regularly nominated in Royal today. It is quite true that at a convention anonymously called at Gagetown, H. H. McLean was nominated as a 'win the war' candidate. No Liberals of any prominence or none at all that I know of joined with the Conservatives in this nomination, and no man can be a union candidate nominated in this way.

"I do not propose to enter into any political argument, however, in this announcement. When the time comes I will be quite willing to discuss how much the country has done for Gen-

eral McLean and how much he has done for his country."

A Unionist Candidate.

Saskatoon, Sask., Nov. 6. — Lieut. Col. Norman Long, who recruited the 65th Battalion, and has just returned from England, is a candidate for the Unionist nomination in Humboldt. Dr. D. B. Neely, former member, will seek the Liberal renomination. No Conservative will be put into the fight.

Three-cornered Fight.

Sault Ste. Marie, Ont., Nov. 6. — T. E. Simpson has consented to contest west Algoma at the request of a committee of Liberal-Conservatives and Liberal-Unionists. This will result in a three-cornered fight, the other two candidates being James Lockwood, Labor, and C. N. Smith, Independent.

A Hero Candidate.

Winnipeg, Nov. 6. — Major G. E. Andrews, D.S.O., a hero of the present war, has consented to have his name to go before a Centre Winnipeg convention as Union candidate.

A Win-the-War Man.

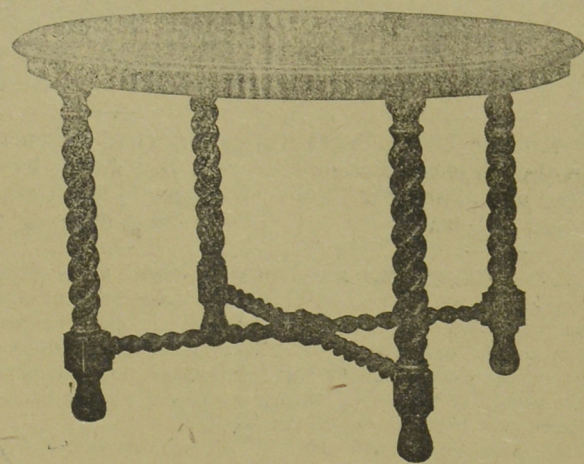

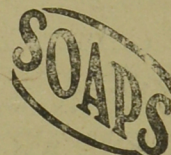
