Ald. Walker Deputy Mayor.

At last night's committee meeting of the city council, Ald. Joseph Walker was appointed deputy mayor under the legislation passed at the last session of the provincial legislature.

Postponed

The concert which was to be held in the Church Hall by The Belgian and Soldiers Relief Society of Devon on Thursday November 8th has been postponed to Thursday, November 15th.

Asks for More Pay.

Mr. Ludlow Malloy, fireman and assistant engineer at the city's street lighting plant, has asked for an increase in wages of ten dollars per month. His application is in the hands of the Street Lighting Committee which has power to act.

New Brunswick A District

Despite reports to the contrary, official advice in regard to New Brunswick as a military command in that the province is now District No. 7, separate and apart from District No. 6. Establishment of the district operated on November 1st, and organization of the command is being rapidly completed.

Active Militia

Canadian Field Artillery—4th Brigade, 10th (Woodstock) Field Battery Provisional lieutenant (superintendent) J. L. Feeney is permitted to retire 15th July, 1917.

Lieutenant J. H. Sproul, 74th Regiment, is confirmed in his appointment as musketry instructor, 10th February, 1914.

Increased Production.

Increased production evidently is going to be followed again next year. Mr. Raymond M. Currie has applied to the city council for permission to use a lot of land near No. 1 Hose Station and also the station building. The matter has been referred to the Fire Committee. Mr. George F. Lockhart has applied for the use of Queen Square. No action has been taken in this.

No Settlement Yet.

Secretary W. S. Hooper of Agricultural Society No. 34 has notified the City Council that the directors of the society have reached no decision with regard to the claim of the city against the exhibition property and that more time would be required. It is probable that the matter will be considered at the annual meeting of the society this month. The insurance premiums on the buildings have been paid by the city.

Goes to Spain.

Telegraph: T. F. Dever, formerly of Fredericton, who for the last few years has been supervisor of the Royal Bank of Canada in Cuba, sailed from there last month for Barcelona, Spain, for the purpose of starting a branch of The Royal Bank in that country. Mrs. M. L. Dever who has been visiting her son will spend the winter in Havana. (Mr. Dever is a nephew of Mr. W. E. Seery of this city.)

Will Carry Matter to Courts.

The University of New Brunswick has notified the city that it is compelled to take steps to have the rights of the parties concerned, to a so-called lane running from University avenue to the C.G.R. tracks stated in the courts. This lane is claimed by the city as a street, and the university which claims ownership, was forbidden to close it some months ago. The Administration of Justice Committee has the matter under consideration.

To Consider Road Matters.

The Administration of Justice Committee of the city council has been asked to take up the matter of closing Brick Kiln Road as a protection for the public. Recently a horse and carriage got in the bog while going out this road and the horse narrowly escaped death. The same committee is to take up the matter of alleged trespasses of Searle & Lamson Ltd., on the right of way of York street above the first cross road, that firm proceeding with the erection of a building there.

Coming to Opera House

Mr. W. T. H. Fenety announces one of the strongest plays which has ever been booked in this city is "Out There," which will be presented here shortly by Elsa Ryan and a powerful company with the original New York production which comes here unchanged. One of the big scenes takes place in a military hospital in France and it is presented with a faithfulness to reality that hundreds of wounded men can establish. The play is written by J. Hartley Manners, author of "Peg O' My Heart."

Refuse to Pay City Taxes.

The efforts of residents of Aberdeen street extension, so-called, to have a street opened in front of their residences have taken a new turn. Last night the city council had before it a communication from Eliza Jane Belyea and Hurd A. Belyea, stating that until a right of way and means of access to and exit from their house was provided they would pay no city taxes. The communication was filed. Those from whom the communication came claim that a similar threat not to pay taxes resulted in the opening of a street across the Pennyfather estate on New Maryland Hill, some years ago. The land required for the street in question is part of the U.N.B. athletic field. The university has set its fence back the necessary distance but the land has not been purchased by the city on account of the price asked, \$2,000.

KILLED IN ACTION
OCTOBER 30TH

His Sister, Mrs. G. C. VanWart,
Received Word This Morning—U. N. B. Graduate
—Practiced Law.

Mrs. G. C. VanWart this morning received official word from Ottawa to the effect that her brother, Lieut. George Paget Owen Fenwick had been killed in action in France on October 30th. The deceased was well known throughout the province. He was a native of Apohaqui, Kings county, and was thirty-five years of age. He was a graduate of Sussex Grammar School, University of New Brunswick and Dalhousie Law School. He also had taken a postgraduate course of two years at Queen's University. For two years he was principal of Dorchester High School and also taught at Wesleyan University, Middleton, Conn. He was a member of the class of 1902 at U.N.B.

He located at Edmonton some years ago and practiced law there. He was appointed to a western Battalion but was transferred to the 115th, but the latter had gone overseas before he joined it and he followed it to England. In April last he went to France and joined a machine gun section. A letter from him written October 10th was received by Mrs. VanWart this morning.

Surviving relatives are two brothers, Rev. L. A. Fenwick of Jacksonville, Carleton county, and William A. Fenwick of North Easton, Mass., and two sisters, Mrs. G. C. VanWart and Miss Lena Fenwick of Fredericton.
