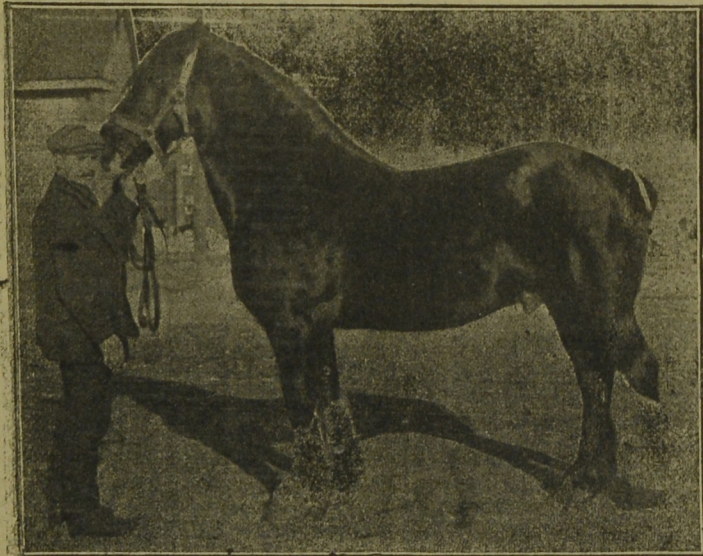

EVERS SIGNS WITH PHILLIES, LEAVES BOSTON

"Human Crab" Plays at Second Base Today in Place of Bert Niehoff—Terms of Deal.

Philadelphia, Pa., July 12. — Manager Pat Moran of the Phillies today announced the signing of Johnny Evers, who will appear at second base in Monday's opening game against Cincinnati, supplanting Bert Niehoff.

The deal has been hanging fire for the last two or three days. The Phillies secured permission of the Boston club to negotiate with Evers several days ago, and Evers was to have come to Philadelphia on Tuesday afternoon to take up the matter with President Baker and Manager Moran. Evers, however, was unavoidably delayed, and when he arrived here about 10 o'clock this morning Mr. Baker had returned to New York. Evers went to the Phillies' grounds, where he met Manager Moran and Business Manager Shettsline.

Evers and Moran were not long in coming to an agreement. In the deal no exchange of playing talent or cash takes place, the local club merely assuming Johnny's high salary, said to be \$10,000, for the balance of the season, the Boston club having agreed to release Evers to the Phillies under these conditions.

Johnny is to remain the property of the Phillies next year provided he continues to play baseball, which means also if he is satisfied to play for the salary that will be offered him in his 1918 contract. In the event of his deciding to retire from the game next season, the local club has agreed to make him a free agent by giving him his unconditional release.

Evers said he felt the Phillies had a fine chance to beat out the Giants for the pennant.

HARVARD DROPS ALL FOOTBALL

Boston, July 13.—There will be no football at Harvard this fall. The announcement of the cancellation of all dates was made yesterday. This also includes freshmen games. This action is due to the war.

When Harvard announced the cancellation of its baseball games during the past spring, it was considered a forerunner of similar action on the football schedule.

There is a possibility, however, that Harvard may engage in occasional informal games with some of the nearby colleges if sufficient interest is shown.

HANK GOWDY GIVEN STRIPES

Columbus, O., July 12. — Henry (Hank) Gowdy, famous catcher for the Boston Nationals, has been promoted from a private to a sergeant in the Ohio National Guard. General John C. Spark has appointed him orderly in the second brigade infantry with the rank of sergeant. Gowdy was the first major league player to answer the call to the colors.

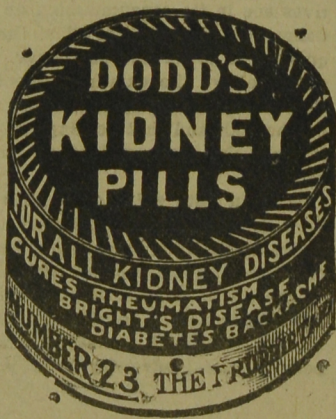

HARTFORD HAS FIXED LIMIT

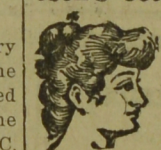
Hartford, Conn., July 12.—Announcement of the late closing events and the programme of the Grand Circuit meeting in this city, September 3 to 7, made today, show that horses to be eligible must be entered in the late closing events by August 20.

The battle royal purse has been withdrawn, since but three entrants had come forward, one of which is now disabled. The entrance fee will be 5 per cent., with 5 per cent. additional for each division of the purse. Two or more horses under one owner may start in any race.

All late closing events will be mile heats, three in five, money to be divided 50, 25, 15 and 10 per cent. to first, second, third and fourth respectively.
