LIBERALS OF THE WEST STAND BY THE OLD CHIEF

Sir Wilfrid Laurier Was Endorsed as Leader of the Liberal Party—Warm Tributes Paid to Him by the Four Western Premiers—East and West to get Together After the Election and Form a National Government.

Winnipeg, Aug. 9. — The Liberal convention of British Columbia, Alberta, Saskatchewan and Manitoba, which has been in session here since Monday evening, was brought to a close at six o'clock this afternoon, when a resolution was carried consolidating as the platform of the Liberal party of western Canada the resolutions on policy which had been adopted.

Following hearty approval of the leadership of Sir Wilfrid Laurier in the morning, the work of the afternoon session was important, and resolutions were carried approving of the formation of a national government after the general election; approving of the principle of government ownership of railways, telegraphs and express systems; declaring indefensible the payment of an arbitrated price to MacKenzie and Mann for sixty million dollars of common stock of the C.N.R., and suggesting that newspapers and other publications be required to publish at intervals the names of all those financially interested in them and of their responsible editors.

Just before adjournment Hon. Frank Oliver read the following telegram which he had received from Sir Wilfrid Laurier and which referred to the proceedings in the convention on Wednesday:

"Resolutions, as reported in morning papers are quite satisfactory. Result is very cheering."

The delegates thereupon cheered Sir Wilfrid very heartily, and followed with three cheers for the chairman and Mr. Oliver, sang the national anthem and dispersed. Most of them are leaving for their homes tonight.

The convention approved of the principle of public ownership being applied to railways, telegraphs and express systems and expressed its belief "that this principle should be applied to all such Canadian systems as soon as the financial and economic conditions of the country permit."

National Government.

The resolution on national government stated that the convention expressed the hope and declared the desire of its members "that in the impending election the discussion of issues should be kept on a plane free from all appeals to passion to prejudice in matters of race and creed; and further, that whichever party is returned to power the business of the government should be carried on by a truly national government composed of representatives drawn from the different elements and industries of Canada."

T. A. Crerar and Mrs. Charles Robson of Winnipeg, moved and seconded the adoption of the resolution. Hon. T. H. Johnson, Winnipeg, declared that the resolution "demonstrates that not office but service to Canada is the goal of this convention."

Amendment Moved.

Will Gibbon, Winnipeg, moved an amendment suggesting that the political parties unite wherever possible in the selection of a candidate, thus effecting a degree of coalition before the election.

Hon. T. C. Norris supported the resolution, and defined a national government as one composed of men selected from all shades of politics without regard to religion, plane of avocation in life.

H. Beveridge of Pincher Creek, Alta., thought the Liberals should treat with the government of the day as to a coalition. "The hand has been held out to you," he said. "Was the convention," he asked, "to adopt the view that all Conservative governments were bad and all Liberal governments good?"

The delegates were becoming impatient, and it was moved that the question be put. It was objected that this was closure, and the debate proceeded. Hon. J. A. Calder of Regina, said that the great difficulty in the way of a national government was Sir Robert Borden. "If Sir Robert Borden understood the situation in Canada and the minds of the people of Canada," said Mr. Calder, "he would have recognized long ago that he must make way. A national government with Sir Robert Borden at its head is absolutely in Canada under present conditions. There is no use in theorizing. The general election as far as we know, is going to be held under two leaders, Borden and Laurier," Mr.

Calder predicted that "a sold west" would come from the convention.

At 5.30 o'clock the resolution was put to the vote. The amendment was withdrawn and the original motion was carried unanimously.

C. N. R. Resolution.

The resolution dealing with the purchase of the C.N.R. common stock, which was referred back to the committee on resolutions yesterday, was presented again, without change, and adopted. It reads:

"That in view of the fact that the Drayton-Acworth commission showed that the equity of MacKenzie & Mann was of no actual value, the arrangement recently submitted to parliament whereby it is proposed to pay an arbitrated price for sixty millions of common stock of the C.N.R. Company is indefensible from any point of view."

The following resolution was adopted without discussion:

"That all newspapers, magazines, trade journals and other periodicals publishing articles designed to influence public opinion shall be compelled, from time to time, to publish sworn statements setting forth the names of the owners, managers, editors, stockholders, bondholders and of any other persons having an interest in such newspaper, magazine, trade journal or other periodical."

Endorsation of Laurier.

At the morning session Hon. A. G. Mackay, of Edmonton, moved the adoption of the following resolution:

"Resolved, that this convention places on record its admiration for the greatest of all Canadians, the Rt. Hon. Sir Wilfrid Laurier."

Mr. MacKay said he firmly believed if voluntary enlistment were given a fair chance, free from profiteering and graft, and the soldiers were paid a better wage, Canada "would come gladly to the colors, and conscription would never need to be brought in."

"The man who goes from a sense of conviction," he continued, "and is not driven as a quarry slave, scourged to his dungeon, will accomplish much more for his country."

Mr. MacKay said the resolution "was not couched in loose words of fulsome flattery."

There were those in the committee who did not see eye to eye with Sir Wilfrid, but they expressed admiration for his honesty and integrity.

Sturdy Western Member the Seconder W. E. Knowles, M. P. for Moose Jaw seconded the resolution. He remarked that today they spoke with greater pride than ever of "that greatest Canadian who was the same great Liberal democrat at all times and under all conditions."

Even were he to oppose Sir Wilfrid Laurier again, said Mr. Knowles, he would do so with the qualification that he was beyond reproach, and that no words of the speaker were equal to the task of expressing his contempt of those who had vilified and traduced him.

Sir Wilfrid Laurier had always worked for the unity of this great country.

Premier Norris, of Manitoba, spoke of Laurier and of his earnest endeavors to carry out his duty as he sees it, in the interest of all Canada, respecting our part in this world struggle.

Premier Martin, of Saskatchewan and Premier Sifton of Alberta and Hon. Frank Oliver also spoke to the resolution which was carried by an overwhelming majority.
