## CONSCRIPTION BILL COMES IN FOR SHARP CRITICISM

Section to Prevent Agitation Against the Measure Adopted With Some Modifications--Single Men and Widowers Without Dependents to Compose the First Draft--Many Fireworks Exploded During Yesterday's Sitting of the House.

Ottawa, July 13. — Just before adjournment at 1 o'clock this morning Hon. Mr. Meighen announced that the proposal, suggested by Hon. Mr. Graham and E. W. Nesbitt and supported by many members at yesterday's sitting, to call out the first three classes together for the first draft had been adopted by the government. This includes all single men and widowers without dependents, from the ages of 21 to 34, inclusive.

The government first proposed to call only the first class, from 21 to 24, inclusive.

At an early hour this (Friday) morning the drastic anti-agitation clauses of the conscription bill, modified by amendments, passed the committee stage in parliament. Sharp criticism of their arbitrary character by Sir Wilfrid Laurier, Hon. Frank Oliver, E. M. Macdonald and others, resulted in certain modifications, while the suggestion of Hon. George P. Graham changing the mandatory decree of suppression of newspapers who offended to a subsection to suppression was accepted by the premier.

The government exercised diplomacy in taking the handling of the clauses out of the hands of Hon. Arthur Meighen, the solicitor general, whose manner is inclined to be dogmatic and irritating, and placed the responsibility in the hands of the more persuasive minister of justice, Hon. C. J. Doherty, who was largely responsible for the progress made. The premier also rendered his assistance during the long night sitting.

There were some fireworks. Mr. Oliver described the clause as a law intended to terrorize the people and "force a conscription upon a disfranchised public."

Hon. Rodolphe Lemieux described it as "a political measure passed by a moribund government."

Mr. Macdonald spoke of it as a political attempt to destroy free discussion and to take away the report of legitimate criticism of those entrusted with the conduct of public affairs.

Hon. Mr. Doherty said the provisions were necessary by reason of the fact that certain persons were already "boasting of their intention to hinder the operation of the act and asserting how easily it would be made inoperative."

### Quebec Member's Threat.

Ernest Lapointe (Kamouraska) pointed out that the bill was to make the issue of a general election and the

provisions seemed to be an attempt to prevent opponents of the bill presenting their case to the electors. When the British conscription bill was before the British house a member of the government said it would be a national folly to apply it to Ireland at the present juncture. He believed that the attempt of a moribund government to impose conscription on Canada without a mandate from the people was a folly and a national crime, "and," added Mr. Lapointe, "I intend to say so to my electors."

"Then you'll go to jail," commented Mr. Robb.

"Perhaps," smiled Mr. Lapointe.

The question of press censorship and the handling of newspapers occasioned prolonged discussion. Mr. Oliver persisted that it was a "censorship against criticism of the government policy and administration which was the right and the proper business of every patriotic newspaper published in the country." The government had already given evidence of partisanship of its censorship administration by suppressing a paper at Sault Ste. Marie and permitting a Montreal paper carrying continuous articles of a seditious character to proceed un molested.

### Le Devoir Mentioned.

"To what paper does the honorable member allude?" asked Mr. Murphy.

"The paper to which I allude is Le Devoir," replied Mr. Oliver, "which, to my mind, has published articles of a seditious tendency, and is the paper which was largely responsible for the return of the present government at the last general election. One notes the discrimination in the manner in which the Sault Ste. Marie paper was suppressed and the failure to suppress the paper which was largely responsible for the election of this government."

George H. Boivin (Shefford) suggested that the press censorship involved in the bill be in the hands of the judges of the supreme court, while D. D. MacKenzie (Cape Breton) suggested that no proceedings against any person or paper under the provisions of the bill be permitted without the consent of the minister of justice. The premier promised to take both suggestions under advisement.

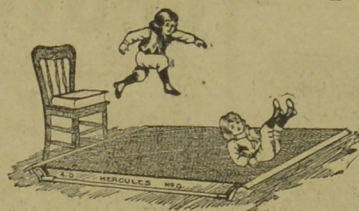

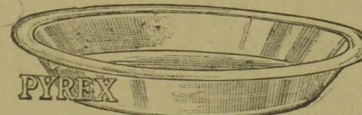

## SUMMARY OF THE WAR NEWS

Another step in the outflanking of the Austro-German armies protecting embarg on the east has been achieved by the Russians, who have crossed the river Lomnica and captured Kaluscz. Beyond the Lomnica and south of the Dniester, west of Halicz, General Korniloff's advance continues.

A great wedge has been torn in the Austro-German lines south of the river Dniester, and the army headquarters in that region was occupied in the taking of KaKluszcz.

The taking of Halicz Tuesday was a threat against the Austro-German line northward through Brezezany along the Zlota Lipa and the crossing of the omnia and an advance beyond is a blow to the security of the line protecting embarg. Should the Russian advance west of Stanislaw continue unchecked and should large Russian forces be thrown across the Dniester in the region of Halicz, the Zlota Lipa line, unbroken by the Russian onslaught of July 1, would be turned, making a general retirement inevitable.

## BATTLEPLANES TAKE PART

## CHEAPER FOOD LIKELY SOON

Ottawa, July 12.—Thorough investigation is being made by Food Controller Hanna and his staff of food prices and supplies throughout Canada. The data as to cold storage companies' operations gathered by W. F. O'Connor, the high cost of living commissioner during the past six months, will be supplemented by further information bringing the data up to the present time, and filling in some links still required to demonstrate whether or not combines are forcing up the prices to such a degree as to require immediate government action demanding the disposal of surplus stocks and lower prices for the necessities of life.

It is intimated that before long Mr. Hanna will be in a position to recommend to the government definite action towards reducing prevailing prices by order-in-council under the War Measures Act. This will be in addition to the movement towards bringing prices down as a result of the campaign against food waste, thus increasing supplies and consequently reducing prices.
