WILLARD READY TO MEET MORRIS OR FRED FULTON

In Letter to Chicago Friends
Says He Has Not Retired—
Gate Receipts Still
Look Good.

New York, July 12. — Jess Willard hasn't the least intention of retiring just yet. He announces that he will be ready to defend his title against Fred Fulton or Carl Morris after the close of the circus season in October. In a letter to friends in Chicago, Willard declares that he weighs 260, about 30 pounds above his best fighting weight. "It is not true that I have refused to box either Carl Morris or Fred Fulton," Willard's letter continues. "Why should I bar those fellows if the public wants me to meet either of them? It is true that I do not like Morris, but that doesn't mean that he is barred. With a little training I can reduce to my best weight. I have no notion of retiring."

It was generally thought that Willard would retire without risking the chance of being defeated. His letter to Chicago, however, makes it certain that he still hankers for a portion of a smashing big championship gate.

BOSTON BRAVES ARE RECEIVING A SHAKING UP

Powell and Rehg Purchased
from Providence—More
New Players Likely to
Join Team.

Boston, July 12. — What may develop into quite a shakeup of the Boston National League baseball club was started Wednesday when the announcement was made of the sale of outfielder Joe Wilhoit to the Pittsburgh club at the waiver price, and the purchase of Ray Powell and Walter Rehg, two outfielders, from the Providence club of the International League. Powell and Rehg are to report at once, and are expected to play in the doubleheader with the Cardinals.

This, according to Manager Stallings, is his beginning of the making of a new ball club. He has had a world of patience with the men he has had under him for the past two seasons and declares that there is no room on the Boston club for a player who is not making good.

Unless there is an immediate improvement in the work of some of the other players, there are, he says, going to be some new deals in the near future.

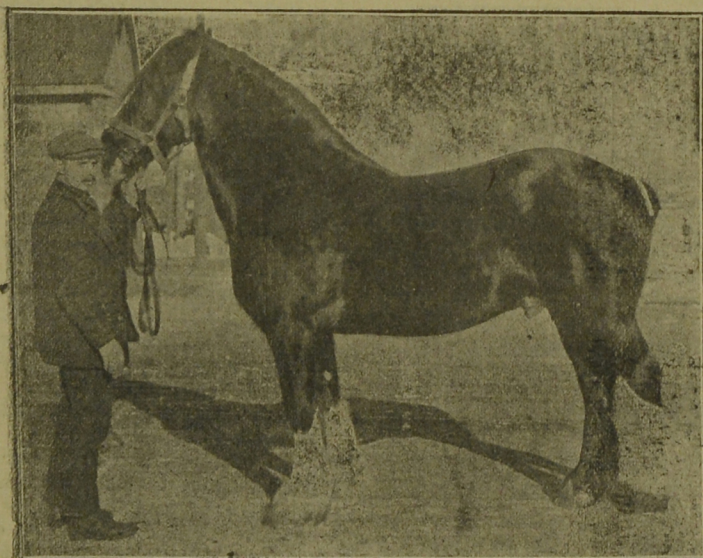

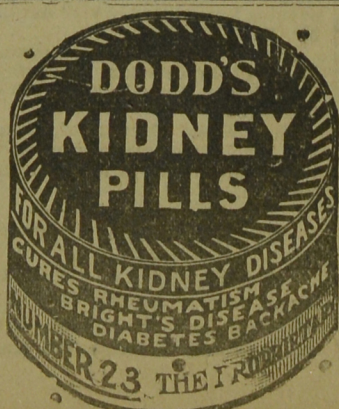
