FROM INSECTS
Unless vegetables are protected
from injurious insects and diseases
either by spraying or by poisoning in
some way, the crop is likely to be a
partial failure or total loss.
The federal department of agricul-
ture recommends several different for-
mulae, so that those in small towns
or out of the way places may obtain
at least one good insecticide or fungi-
cide.

Cabbage, cauliflower, onions, rad-
ishes, turnips may be infected with
different insects, namely flea-beetles,
caterpillars, root maggots or cut
worms.

For flea-beetles use Paris green im-
mediately the plants appear above the
ground, and for cabbage worms use
pyrethrum. This can be prepared
from one ounce of pyrethrum powder
to three gallons of water.

In destroying root maggots insect
powder or hellebore in water poured
over the roots at intervals of a week,
and carbolic emulsion may be used.
For cut worms poisoned bran is the
best remedy. To make this mix ½ to
1 pound of Paris green thoroughly
with 50 pounds of slightly moistened
bran, sweetened with a little molasses
or sugar. If this poisoned bran is
scattered on the ground near the
plants to be protected the cut worm
will eat it in preference to the plants
and die.

TELLS STORY OF
POISON PLOT

Woodstock, N. B., July 12.—The pre-
liminary examination of James Tapley,
charged with attempted murder, was
held today at Bristol before Stipendi-
ary Nobles. The Frenchman whom
Tapley is alleged to have hired to
poison the Shannons, was on the stand
and told the same story as reported in
yesterday's despatch.

Dr. Peppers, White Bishop and an-
other man testified to seeing Tapley
with the witness. Tapley has already
said he never saw the man.

The hearing will be continued tomor-
row and an adjournment will likely
be made to a further hearing at Wood-
stock.

H. P. Hartley is acting for Tapley
and C. J. Jones is appearing for the
crown.
