Unless vegetables are protected from injurious insects and diseases either by spraying or by poisoning in some way, the crop is likely to be a partial failure or total loss.

The federal department of agriculture recommends several different formulae, so that those in small towns or out of the way places may obtain at least one good insecticide or fungicide

Cabbage, cauliflower, onions, radishes, turnips may be infected with different insects, namely fiea-beetles, caterpillars, root maggots or cut

For flea-beetles use Paris green immediately the plants appear above the ground, and for cabbage worms use pyrethrum. This can be prepared from one ounce of pyrethrum powder to three gallons of water.

In destroying root maggots insect

powder or hellebore in water powred over the roots at intervals of a week, and carbolic emulsion may be used. For cut worms poisoned bran is the best remedy. To make this mix 1/2 to pound of Paris green thoroughly with 50 pounds of slightly moistened bran, sweetened with a little molasses or sugar. If this poisoned bran is scattered on the ground near the plants to be protected the cut worm will eat it in preference to the plants


