STILL SOME HOPE FOR A COALITION GOVERNMENT

Sir Clifford Sifton Still on the Job as Cabinet Maker for Sir Robert Borden—Negotiations Being Carried on With Western Politicians --The Olive Branch Being Held Out to Premier Sifton, Hon. J. A. Calder and Others.

(Montreal Star.)

Ottawa, Aug. 23. — Western Canada once more holds the balance in the political scale and interest in the situation again is centred in Winnipeg. Messrs. Sifton, Calder, Crerar and Woods, who came down to Ottawa at the beginning of the week in connection with the negotiation for Union Government, went home and are due in Winnipeg today.

There, before the week-end, they are scheduled to meet their friends and the political leaders from the three provinces, and decide if they are prepared to enter on Union Government under the leadership of Sir Robert Borden. A final answer is expected by the end of this week or early next week.

It can be stated that the general principles of Union were defined before Hon. J. A. Calder, Hon. A. L. Sifton and Messrs. Crerar and Woods left for the West. There has been some discussion as to leadership, but the Western men, it is understood, are willing to accept Sir Robert Borden. They regard him as the best man around whom the win-the-war forces may rally.

The economic question always looms up, but there is no reason to believe that, in the final analysis, it can be stalled and the platform and policy of the war government be confined essentially to war measures. Fiscal questions usually are not so urgent that they cannot be deferred, and if there should be urgency they can be dealt with as war measures.

Calder Pivotal Point.

The really pivotal point seems to be Mr. Calder. A cold, calculating politician with a genius for organization, Mr. Calder is a sort of key-stone in the present negotiations. If he will come in, he will bring with him the party organization in Saskatchewan, and it is believed that should he so decide, it will be a dominating factor in influencing Messrs. Sifton and Crerar.

The "man behind" the Saskatchewan Government has the centre of the stage. To a very peculiar degree he is the deciding factor.

There is a general agreement that Union Government is of little utility unless it bring about a strong Ministry, really representative of both parties. A "bob-tail" affair, it is felt, might possibly intensify and extend the area of Parliamentary opposition.

Unionists Confident.

With Mr. Sifton, Premier of Alberta, Mr. Crerar, head of the Grain Growers, and Mr. Calder and the power he wields in Saskatchewan, all in a Union Government, it would be a formidable ministry calculated to carry easily that part of the country destined to be the crucial battleground in the weeks to come.

The situation, as stated, is largely up to Mr. Calder, if he comes. The gossip has it that Mr. Sifton and Crerar will come also. The best that can be said today is that the Unionists are hopeful, if not confident, of the success.

The negotiations so far have been only with the West. The idea is that Liberals would predominate there. In Ontario it would be the Conservatives, with Hugh Guthrie and a representative of Labor added. For the latter post the names of Senator Robertson and of J. G. O'Donoghue, solicitor for the Trades and Labor Congress, are mentioned.

There have been some hopes of F. B. Carvell's entry, but not much is to be expected from that source for reasons which have already been stated. Mr. Carvell's speeches yesterday were hardly those of an enthusiastic unionist.

If there is a union government, it will have the support of the greater part of the conscription Liberals in the House, but not all of them. The rest will stay with Sir Wilfrid Laurier. There are some Conservatives unquestionably who endorse Mr. Rogers' position, and who may do so to the end, but the rank and file of the party will be found to support any alliance, especially if it be a strong and successful alliance which Sir Robert Borden is able to negotiate.

MANY CLAIMS RE OTTAWA FIRE

Ottawa, Aug. 23. — A return tabled in the Commons gives details of the claims made for losses in the Parliament Building fire the session before last. Some of the claims are illuminating as marking invidious distinctions between the great majority of members who lost wearing apparel or other valuables in the fire but who have made no claim on the Government for the loss, and the few members who think they should be recompensed.

Hon. Albert Seigney, then Speaker of the Commons and now a minister of the crown, puts in a claim for \$1,040. The itemized amount covers many articles of the Speaker's wardrobe and the wardrobe of his wife and two children. One of the items is for "wines in the vault, \$75." Mr. Seigney also wants \$50 for the loss of toys for his two little girls.

H. Boulay, M. P., has a rather unique bill for \$1,719. It includes one razor, \$7; a pair of spectacles, \$3; literary documents, etc., \$100; one book of accounts, about \$700; and three promissory notes valued at \$890.

J. E. Marcille, M. P., asks \$160 for the loss of wearing apparel. Hon. T. S. Sproule applies for \$64, and A. Bellemare has a bill for \$50 on similar account. Mr. Bellemare, in writing to the Minister of Justice about his claim says: "We are called upon to subscribe, so often, we members, for patriotic works of all kinds, that it seems to me the Government at least should not think of refusing the just demand made upon it."

The only other member of Parliament who has thus far put in a claim is Hon. Martin Burrell, Minister of Agriculture, who was himself severely burned in the fire. He asked for \$50 to recoup him for the loss of wearing apparel.

All the claims are being considered by a special meeting of the cabinet.

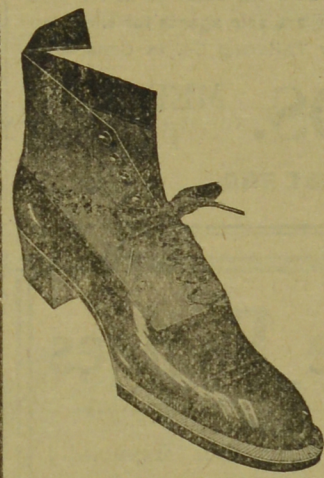
