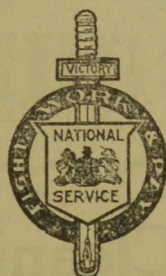

Anderson Wilkes Won From Him Yesterday at Philadelphia—New Track Record of 2.06 1/2.

Philadelphia, Aug. 22. — Single G., Fred Jamieson's pacer, by Anderson Wilkes, suffered his first defeat of the season today, when he was beaten by Miss Harris M., in three straight heats in the free-for-all pace, the feature event of the third-day's card of the Grand Circuit meeting. The third heat was stepped in 2.02 1/2, a new track record.

In the event for three-year-old trotters, Bert Maguire proved an easy winner in straight heats, stepping the second heat in 2.09 3/4.

The 2.15 pace went to Marjorie Kay in straight heats.

The best race of the day was the 2.09 trot, won by Sister Strong in three straight heats.

SEVENTY-NINE COURSES GIVEN

Girls' Clubs Have Taken Great Interest in Domestic Science—Work Still Going On.

Seventy-nine short courses in canning and preserving perishable foods have so far been given by the Domestic Science Teachers of New Brunswick in their vacation campaign, among the girls' clubs. The courses last from three to five days. Besides the practical canning and preserving which the volunteer teachers have carried on, they have given each club a course of talks and demonstrations in drying, salting and storing foods. Lectures have been given on the food situation in relation to the war, possible economies that patriotic people should practice, and suitable substitutes that might be made for wheat. A scientific background has been given all this work, by talks on food values, and appropriate exhibits.

Below is a list of the places in which the short courses have been given. One or more clubs have been organized in each. One town has seven flourishing organizations, more than 1,200 girls have been enlisted. Practically all of these centres have been visited, and their clubs organized by the Provincial Director of Manual Training and Domestic Science since the beginning of vacation. Both he and the teachers are serving without remuneration. The work is still in progress, other localities have already been organized, and the teachers will serve them during the next two weeks.

Courses have been given in the following places: Campbellton, Dalhousie, Jacquet River, Bathurst, East Bathurst, Caraquet, East Caraquet, Douglastown, Newcastle 2, Chatham 7, Richibucto, Rexton, Harcourt 2, Ford's Mills, Shediac, Sackville, Dorchester, College Bridge, Moncton 4, Sunnyside, Hillsboro, Hopewell Cape, Riverside, Albert, Havelock, Petitcodiac, Anagance, Sussex, Apohaqui, Norton, Chipman, Bloomfield, Hampton, Kingston 2, St. Martins, Salmon River, St. John 2, Fairville, Fredericton Junction, Harvey, McAdam Junction 2, St. Stephen 2, Milltown 2, St. Andrews 2, St. George 2, The Ledge 2, Pomeroy Ridge, Fredericton 4, Lower St. Marys, Lower Maugerville, Canterbury Station, Debec, Woodstock 2, Jacksonville 2, Hartland 2, Florenceville, Bath, Andover, Grand Falls, Gagetown.

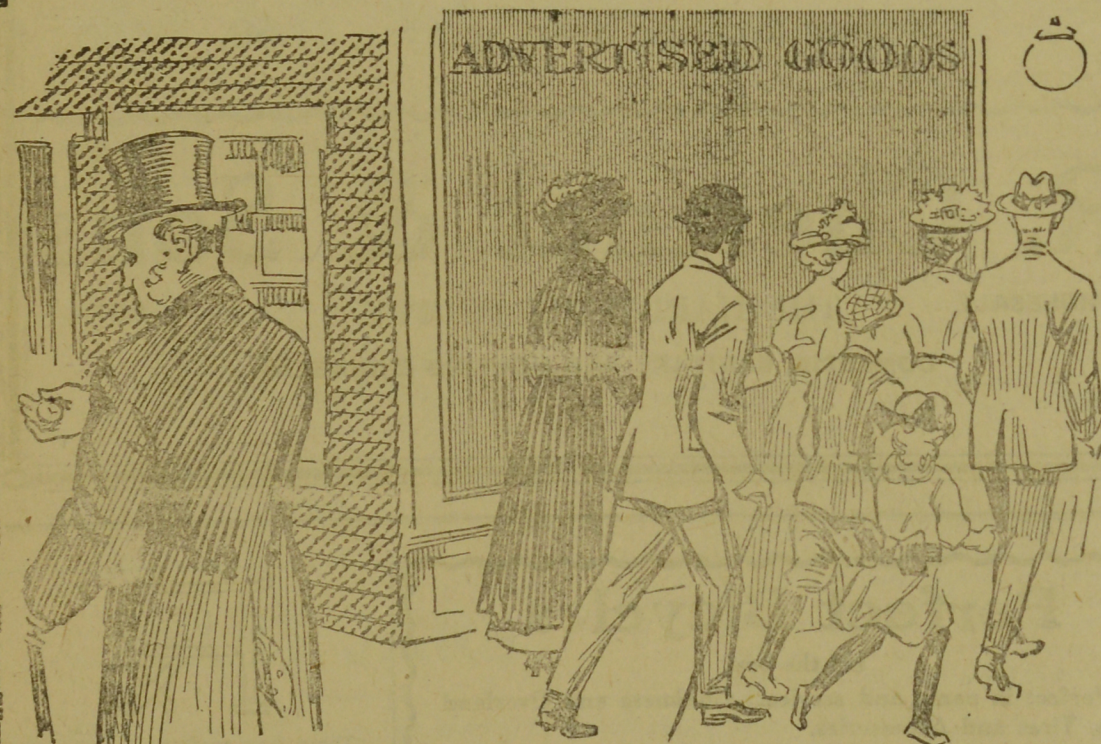

THE ROAD TO THE RIGHT.

YOU'VE met at least one of those few good old souls, who are constantly getting the worst of it when shopping, who don't believe in advertising. A hundred disappointing and instructive experiences have failed to teach him their plain lesson.

When he bought his first watch he was beguiled into buying one without a known name or a trustworthy guarantee. That watch—a poor timekeeper—cost him dearly by reason of missed appointments and missed trains, and for frequent repairs. Yet he paid the price of a good watch.

It is the same story with regard to his underwear, his shoes, and his fountain pen.

This good old soul's case is not unique. Many of us, if the truth be confessed, resemble him; we allow ourselves to be sold merchandise with an unknown brand or trade mark instead of buying merchandise which is well known to us through the medium of advertising. In slang language, we get "stung" pretty often.

In most of these cases we have ourselves to blame, for "the road to the right" thing to buy has been made plain by advertising.

There is no good reason for passing by the known thing, soundly guaranteed, to buy a dubious article, which, quality for quality, cannot be cheaper than the known, branded article.
