SEASONABLE RECEIPTS

Rice Fritters.

Rice fritters are made with cold boiled rice. To $\frac{1}{2}$ cup add a beaten egg, $\frac{1}{2}$ cup of rich milk and enough flour to make a fritter batter. Drop in spoonfuls in a skillet in hot butter and brown on both sides. Serve with honey or with maple syrup or sprinkle with salt and serve as a vegetable.

Potato Chowder

Parboil and slice 6 fine potatoes, fry $\frac{1}{2}$ pound of sweet salt pork (chopped) and when it begins to crisp add a minced onion and cook to a light brown. Pack in layers in a soup kettle, sprinkle each layer with pepper and minced parsley. Add the hot fat, cover with a pint of boiling water and simmer 30 minutes. Turn into a colander and drain the liquor back into the kettle. Have ready a pint of hot milk into which has been stirred a tablespoon of butter, rolled in flour; add to the liquor, cook one minute, return the potatoes to the kettle and serve.

Red Cabbage


Chop a small red cabbage and soak in cold water for an hour. Throw 2 tablespoons of bacon fat in the frying pan and fry a tablespoon of chopped onion for 5 minutes. Drain off the water from the cabbage and throw the cabbage in the frying pan. Season with salt and cayenne pepper and allow it to cook till the cabbage is tender. The moisture from the cabbage will supply enough water if cooked slowly. Add 2 teaspoons of brown sugar and a few tablespoons of vinegar, 5 minutes before taking up.

Purée of Split Peas

One-half cup split peas, 4 cups water or ham stock, 2 slices onion, 1 cup hot milk, $\frac{1}{2}$ teaspoonful pepper, 1 tablespoonful bacon fat, 1 tablespoonful flour. Soak the peas overnight in cold water, then drain, add fresh water or the stock and on-



AN APPEAL
ON BEHALF OF
ARMENIANS

"One year ago, in compliance with resolutions passed by the senate and by the house of representatives, I appointed days upon which the people of the United States might make such contributions as they felt disposed for the aid of the stricken Armenian and Syrian peoples.

American diplomatic and consular representatives and other American residents recently returned from western Asia assure me that many thousands of lives were saved from starvation by the gifts of the American people last winter. They also bring full assurance of the continued effective distribution of relief and report that the suffering and death from exposure and starvation will inevitably be very much greater this winter than last unless the survivors can be helped by further contributions from America.

"Reports indicate that of orphans alone there are more than 400,000, besides women and other dependent children, reaching a total of more than 2,000,000 destitute survivors. The situation is so distressing as to make a special appeal to the sympathies of all.

"In view of the urgent need I call again upon the people of the United States to make such further contributions as they feel disposed, in their sympathy and generosity for the aid of these suffering peoples. Contributions may be made through the American Red Cross, Washington, D. C., or direct to the American Committee for Armenian and Syrian Relief, Cleveland H. Dodge, treasurer, No. 1 Madison Ave., New York City."

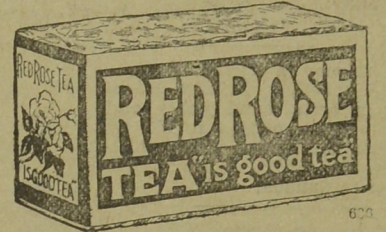

NEWS FROM THE ITALIAN
FRONT IS DISHEARTENING

New York, Oct. 30.—A London cable to the Tribune says that the Italian army is now in full flight and that the Teutons are rushing on practically unchecked to the Venetian plains. The second army is also fleeing pell mell and the roads are choked with retreating soldiers and civilians. Cadorna is preparing for a last stand.

From the head of the Gulf of Trieste northward along the Isonzo front to beyond Tolmino, and thence westward through the Carnic Alps region to the Ploeken Pass forming the eastern and northeastern boundaries of the Austro-Italian front, the Germans and Austro-Hungarian troops are operating fast and strongly against the Italians in an endeavor to crush the forces of General Cadorna.

Already the enemy, according to the German official communication, is now standing before the town of Udine, the former grand headquarters of the Italian army, having driven on past Gorizia, he has captured the town of Cormons, ten miles to the southeast of Udine, and the entire Italian line to the southward to the head of the Adriatic is reported to be in retreat.

Third Wedge at Ploeken Pass. In addition to the wedges driven into the Italian front on the east and northeast, the Teutonic allies have begun a third wedge in the north through the Ploeken Pass, their hope evidently being to cut off the retreat of the greater portion of General Cadorna's armies moving west and southwest.

The Italian commander-in-chief reports however that his men are checking the advance in this region. Evidently the weakness among the Italians has been entirely overcome, as Cadorna says that all moments ordered by the general staff now are being carried out in regular order and that the Italians are fulfilling their duty "by keeping in check the enemy's advance into the plains."

Meantime, in order to aid the Italians in their hour of trouble, Great Britain and France are preparing to

lend immediate aid and the possibility is that already troops are being hastened across the western Italian frontier and by way of Turin and Milan to the battle front and the east.

As a result of the Teutonic allied offensive, internal conditions in Italy are declared to have been unified, the preponderating idea of the entire populations now being to abolish party lines in order to meet the situation in the best interests of the country. Even the cabinet crisis is expected to be solved with comparatively few changes in portfolios.
