Bayfield Mitchell, a Halifax ex-policeman, has been found guilty and sentenced to three months in jail, for selling liquor in eggshells to wounded soldiers, who landed at Halifax on their return to Canada.

Is now in France.
Mr. F. L. Cooper of this city this morning received a cablegram informing him that his eldest son, Gunner Roger Cooper, who left Canada with a unit of heavy artillery, is now in France.

Mrs. Angus Edney who has been teaching school at Dumfries has resigned her school and will remove to her home at Taymouth. Her husband is serving overseas with the 104th Battalion. She has been in ill health but expects to be able to resume teaching after Christmas.

Cannot Enlist After This.
Sergeant Major H. T. Brewer who is in charge of the local recruiting office has been notified that after this men between the ages of twenty and thirty-four must not be enlisted but after registration and medical examination can apply at the recruiting office to be assigned to units which want recruits.

Appointed Chaplain.
Rev. Father Costello of the staff of St. Thomas' College, Chatham, has been appointed overseas chaplain and is now preparing to cross to the other side. Father Costello comes from an old military family, his father having been a colonel in the Union army during the civil war in the United States.

Small Boy Arrested.
A small boy belonging to this city was arrested by the police last night for loitering about livery stables and failing to give a satisfactory account of himself. He informed the police that he was employed by Scott & Forbes on the new convalescent home but this was found to be untrue and the boy is held for disposal by the police magistrate.

Adjourned Until 20th Proximo.
The York County Court met this morning and adjourned until November 20th when the case of J. Frank Grant vs. James Bates will be heard. McLellan & Hughes and Jones & Jones are the counsel. The latter firm is engaged on Carleton Circuit Court cases and adjournment was made on that account. The action is for \$200 for groceries alleged by the plaintiff to have been supplied.

To Arrive Thursday.
Word was received at district headquarters yesterday that Brigadier-General A. H. Macdonnell, D. S. O., C. B., would arrive in St. John on Thursday to take over the command of this military district as G. O. C. With his coming it is expected that the many details in connection with the new Military District No. 7 for this province will be completed. The creation of the new district will necessarily mean new offices, and a thorough organizing of the province.

To Boom War Loan.
The local committee which is to boost the war loan held another organization meeting last evening and made good progress with their plans. It is proposed to hold a series of public meetings throughout the county and place the claims of the war loan before the people who have money to invest. A staff of volunteer salesmen has been secured and will make a thorough canvass of the city and municipalities of York and Sunbury. It is proposed to give everybody a chance to help win the war.

Death at Taymouth.
John Edney, a well known resident of Taymouth, died at his home there early this morning, aged seventy years. He had been in his ordinary health last night and death came unexpectedly. The deceased had been a carpenter by trade but in recent years had resided on his farm at Taymouth. He is survived by a widow, formerly Miss McBean of Taymouth, two daughters, Mary at home and Mrs. Angus Forbes of Portage, and two sons, Angus, now overseas with the 104th Battalion, and Fred at home. The funeral will take place at 2 p. m. Wednesday, Rev. Mr. MacPherson officiating.

A STITCH IN TIME SAVES NINE.

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C. FITZRANDOLPH RETURNS HOME AFTER SERVICE

Twice Wounded in France—Has Resigned—Lieutenants Tweedie and Doone Return.

Mr. Charles FitzRandolph of this city, who left Canada with the 115th Battalion and who was twice wounded in France where he served as lieutenant with a Winnipeg battalion, arrived in Fredericton yesterday. He has returned to civilian life, having been permitted to resign his commission, the resignation going into effect a few days ago.

Twice Wounded.
Mr. Randolph states that he is in good physical condition, having recovered from the effects of his wounds. He crossed to England with the 115th Battalion, which was raised and quartered at St. John. After being a week in England he was transferred to the Winnipeg battalion which was in France with the 4th Division. He was wounded August 15th, 1916, on the Somme, and went to England. Upon recovering he was sent back to his battalion in France rejoining it in January last. On June 3rd last he was wounded again.

Saw Fredericton Men.
Though being transferred to a western unit he did not see many Fredericton men in France. Last May he saw Gunner Clive VanWart of this city on Vimy Ridge. He also saw Lt. John Stephens, formerly a professor at the U.N.B., in France. In England he saw Capt. Royden Barbour of this city, after he had recovered from wounds. Major J. H. MacDonald, formerly pastor of the Brunswick Street Baptist church in this city, also was one of the officers he saw in England.

Other Returned Officers.
Among other returned officers who were on the same steamer with Mr. Randolph were Lieut. A. H. Tweedie

RETAIL PRICE OF MILK WILL BE INCREASED

To be Either 11 or 12 Cents per Quart After November 1—Retailers Have Not Yet Decided Which.

Fredericton milk consumers are to have the privilege of paying more for milk after November 1st, which is Thursday. The only doubtful feature is how much the increase in price is to be. The retailers have not decided whether the price is to be eleven cents per quart or twelve. A meeting was held last night for the purpose of reaching a decision concerning this matter but nothing was done on account of most attendants. Another meeting is to be held.

The general price of milk now is ten cents per quart although some dealers have been selling for nine cents, a lower rate being charged if the consumer delivers the milk himself.

This action on the part of the milkmen others in the retail milk trade has been expected since the formation of the York County Milk & Cream Producers' Association, which placed the price of milk at the dairy at six cents per quart.

There is general speculation as to what action the Department of Food Control will take in regard to the matter, particularly in view of the fact that Hon. Mr. Hanna some time ago requested that there be no increase in milk prices until his department had considered the situation.

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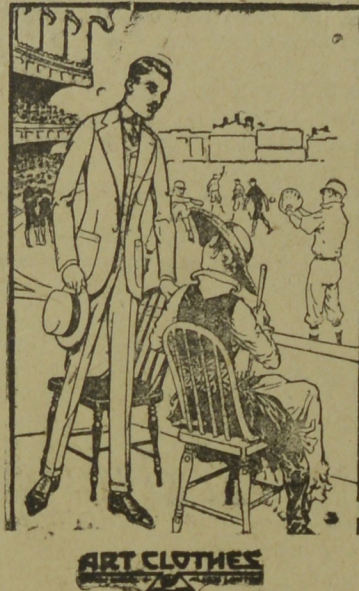
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
