SOME AMATEUR GARDENERS WHO HAVE HAD GREAT SUCCESS

An Immense Quantity of Garden Truck Raised in Fredericton This Year---Mr. John Neill and Mr. Luke S. Morrison Have Done Well as Gardeners.

The greater production movement has developed some first class amateur gardeners in this city and they have gardens which are a constant source of joy and pride to them. It is remarkable the quantity of garden truck that can be produced on a small piece of highly cultivated land. The gardens in this city contain about everything that the climate will stand. Many of the amateurs had green peas and beans a month ago and have been gathering ripe tomatoes and cucumbers for a fortnight. Beans and potatoes are the principal crops handled by the amateurs and the yield is reported to be a splendid one.

One of the largest and finest gardens in the city is the property of Mr. Luke S. Morrison. It is located on the vacant lot on Charlotte street opposite his home and contains two thirds of an acre. It represents Mr. Morrison's first attempt at gardening and the land had not previously been cultivated for forty years. Nearly one third of the plot is growing field beans and he expects to gather from it about 1500 pounds. He also has a large potato patch from which he expects a yield of twenty-five barrels. The rest of the plot is taken up with garden vegetables and all are in a healthy and flourishing condition. Already he has 100 pounds of ripe tomatoes and he has been using other vegetables for over a fortnight. Mr. Morrison has the

finest cabbage, Cauliflowers and turnips to be found in the city.

Another Successful One

Another amateur gardener who has achieved success is Mr. John Neill of Niell never attempted much in the James S. Neill & Sons, Limited. Mr. way of gardening until this season. He has a large plot of land adjoining the Neill homestead and has made it blossom as the rose. He has the finest tomato patch to be found in any city garden. In all there are eighty plants including the cherry and plum varieties for preserving. He has the plants trained on stakes and some of them are over six feet high. Mr. Neill has met with good success in raising bush peas. He has four or five large rows of them and has already canned thirty quarts for winter use. He has also had great success with corn, cucumbers, onions and beans. Some of his cornstalks are nine feet high and he has onions grown from seed which are two inches in diameter. He has a row of sweet peas six feet high and claims there is nothing in the city to hold a candle to them. Mr. Neill's fine garden attracts many visitors and he has received many compliments on his success as a tiller of the soil.

There is no doubt about it that in the matter of gardens Fredericton has all cities and towns in the maritime provinces beaten to a standstill.

QUARTER OF A MILLION STOLEN FROM THE PEOPLE

(St. John Globe.)

As the result of conversations with Hon. James K. Flemming, Premier of the Province, while negotiating with Mr. Flemming and his government for a railway contract, Mr. A. R. Gould agreed to make a political contribution of \$100,000, and subsequently carried out the agreement, paying upwards of \$75,000 of the money to Mr. Flemming and the remainder as he directed. That there were payments by Mr. Gould to other members of the government and to others more or less closely identified with provincial politics, is the inference to be drawn from a question asked Mr. Gould in his examination before Chief Justice McKeown on Thursday, but over-ruled as having no bearing on the matter at issue. Ways and means should be found by the present provincial government to get these and any other as yet untold facts before the country in a way that can leave no doubt of

their accuracy. Mr. Gould's admission of the payments to Hon. Mr. Flemming establish finally what has long been suspected.

His testimony that Hon. Mr. Flemming suggested the payment when the contract negotiations were on, and before the contract was signed, establishes a guilty compact and furnishes the direct proof for a criminal prosecution the Attorney General should not lose a minute in starting. It was as Premier of this province that Hon. Mr. Flemming negotiated with Mr. Gould for the construction of the Valley Railway, and it was as Premier of this province that he suggested or demanded the contribution which was in effect the price of the contract. The evidence of Mr. Gould presents the man whose duty it was to safeguard and protect the interests of this province and drive the best possible bargain with the contractor, negotiating personally with that contractor for a share of the profits. Considered in connection with the more recent exposure of payments on the lower section contracts, the Valley Railway contractors and sub-contractors appear to have generously dispersed upwards of a quarter of a million dollars, possibly considerably more, to politicians and the intimates of politicians.

What a revelation of political rotteness it is, and the unanswered questions suggest that much yet remains to be told.
