YORK OPPOSITION CONVENTION ON SATURDAY

This Was the Decision of a Large and Representative Gathering Last Evening
---Strong Revulsion of Feeling Against The Men Now Misruling the Province.

The first gun in the Opposition's campaign in York was fired last evening at a meeting held in the committee rooms in the Spahn building, over the store of Mr. J. P. Farrell, Queen street. Despite the short notice and heavy snow storm, fifty sturdy electors from the city and outlying districts were in attendance. Mr. Peter J. Hughes, barrister, occupied the chair, and delivered a vigorous address in which he dealt with some of the issues of the campaign. Other addresses were delivered by Mr. N. W. Brown of Middle Southampton, Coun. J. G. Douglass, of Stanley, Coun. W. P. Lawson, of McAdam, ex-Coun. Goodspeed, of Penniac, and others.

The consensus of opinion was that the prospects of winning a great victory in York were never brighter. It was stated that there was a strong revulsion of feeling against the government, and many who had actively supported it in the last contest were now among its most outspoken critics and opponents. It was unanimously resolved that a convention of opponents of the government for the selection of candidates be held with the least possible delay, and a strong committee was appointed to make the necessary arrangements. The committee met

immediately after the general meeting and decided upon Saturday, February 10th, as the date of the convention, and fixed the hour at two o'clock.

Great enthusiasm prevailed at the meeting and each and every one present expressed a willingness to go into the contest and work unceasingly until the close of the polls.

In Northumberland.

Chatham, Feb. 5.—A meeting of the Opposition workers took place tonight in the town hall to nominate delegates for the convention to be held here next Monday. The prospects look good for a strong ticket to oppose the government in the coming election. Several names have been mentioned, but nothing definite will be done for a few days yet; but one thing is sure, and that is that, notwithstanding the short notice, there will be a good fight in Northumberland for good government.

In Carleton County.

Woodstock, Feb. 5.—The Opposition executive met here tonight and decided to hold a convention next Saturday to nominate the three Opposition candidates for the coming provincial election. There is sure to be a lively fight in this county for good government.

Dear Sir,—I notice in your issue of January 22nd that on account of impaired health due to overwork I have been obliged to go to California for a much needed rest. I regret that such a rumor should be circulated, as it is not based on fact. Since coming to Vancouver I have enjoyed the best of health and greatly appreciated the work. Since beginning my work I have preached every Sunday, baptized fifteen, buried ten and married twenty-six couples, visited over four hundred families, listened to several noted statesmen, heard several local politicians, and last but not least, was one of over ten thousand who heard Billy Sunday deliver his famous "booze sermon."

A trip to California is a simple matter from Vancouver, and I hope some day to have that pelasure, not when I am ill, but in the best of health.

I was greatly pleased to see that St. Paul's Church had such a good year, the one disappointment being that the minister had been temporarily laid aside. It is a source of constant satisfaction to find in the west the enduring character of the work being done by our church in the Maritime Provinces. It is a keen disappointment for the east to lose so many excellent people, but there is this compensation that they are doing equally good work in the west, and the Kingdom is one.

My friends will be interested in knowing that notwithstanding the strenuous conditions in the west, my congregation contributed for all purposes over \$16,000, of which over \$5,000 was for missions.

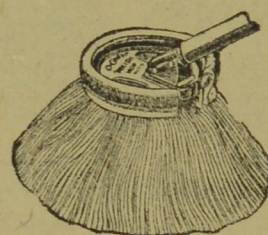
