## ALMOST RAMMED

### GERMAN U-BOAT

Leyland Liner Canadian Had Thrilling Experience Near English Coast.

Boston, March 19.—The Leyland Line steamship Canadian, which arrived in Boston yesterday from Liverpool, almost accomplished the destruction of a German submarine as she was nearing the English port on her last journey across the Atlantic, according to the members of her crew.

The submarine, which was lying in wait to launch a torpedo against the Canadian, barely saved itself by submerging in record time.

Capt. Bullock, commander of the Leyland liner, was at the wheel and the vessel, 150 miles from Liverpool, had just dropped astern of the naval convoy, which had escorted her past the most dangerous part of the German barred zone. Suddenly the captain caught sight of the submarine lying awash almost in his path, evidently waiting for the liner to reach a favorable position before firing. Calling for full speed ahead, Captain Bullock steered his vessel directly for the German craft, hoping to ram and sink it.

The submarine commander was warned in time, however, and managed to sink beneath the surface. A slight scraping along the keel of the Canadian indicated that she had grazed the submarine and perhaps sunk it. The Canadian's captain, however, did not stop to ascertain the success of his manoeuvre, but hastened away to port, guiding his ship in zigzags well clear of the danger zone.

## GLASS COVERED FARMS

### A THRIVING INDUSTRY

How New Jerseys Furnish Ripe Tomatoes in Winter and Cucumbers and Other Early Vegetables.

Newark, March 18.—Winter farming under glass is becoming a thriving industry in New Jersey. It bids fair to be further stimulated by soaring prices and the general scarcity of fresh farm products such as can be successfully stored and held over after the regular summer growing season.

There are a number of these "winter farms" in various parts of the state, but few of them have made greater growth or have so large an output as one operated in Deerfield township, has gained fame in recent years by reason of its extensive irrigation system.

## MAXIMILLIAN HARDEN EXPRESSES HIS VIEWS

London, March 18.—Maximilian Harden, writing in the last issue of Die Zukunft and quoted by Reuter's Amsterdam correspondent, says with reference to the occupation of Bagdad by the British:

"Only a blockhead or one to whom the map of the world has taught nothing, or lies to himself in order to lie better to others, can deny the importance of the change of power in Turkish Asia.

"Since the birthday of the submarine war, which was greeted with gushing hope, the greatest republics on the earth, the United States and China, have resolved to break off diplomatic relations with Germany."

Herr Harden suggests the possibility of a triple alliance between the United States, China and Japan, which he says would permit more energetic participation in the war. To doubters of such a possibility he replies that Great Britain, France and Russia, before yielding, would attempt everything imaginable, and declares that the limits of the imaginable are not to be underestimated with the powers whom Australia and Africa obey, and who dominate the land and water from New York to Petrograd, and from Kamchatka to Trebizond."

son of its extensive irrigation system, covering several hundred acres.

There are six greenhouses. They are built of steel and glass and each is 300 feet long by 60 feet wide. Care has been taken in laying out this winter farm to take every advantage of the sunshine.

With the frigid winter world shut out by the expansive glass roof, this snug farm has a succession of summer days right in the midst of the bleak months of December, January and February.

The farming under glass is done on a very intensive scale. Three or four crops of such vegetables as radishes can be raised during a single season and no space is permitted to go to waste.

Cucumbers have special wire trellises by the Seabrooks Farms Co., which lises to climb over, and, unlike those in the ordinary garden, the vines are not permitted to ramble about at will. It is the greenhouse-grown tomatoes that require the most attention. After the tomato plants are set in the ground each one is carefully staked. Lateral branches are carefully pruned off and the vine or plant is trained into an upright single stalk. As the flowers develop they are pollinated carefully by a gentle shaking process. The leaves are cut away from around the clusters of fruit as they develop. As this process proceeds the green and ripening tomatoes hang in bunches along the single upright stalk.

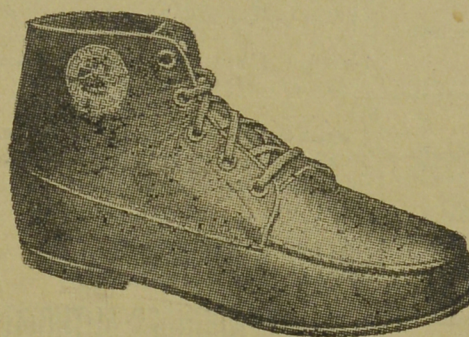

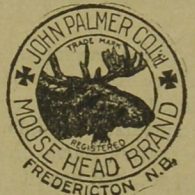

All payments are to be made to a chartered bank for the credit of the Minister of Finance. Failure to pay any instalment when due will render previous payments liable to forfeiture and the allotment to cancellation.

Subscriptions, accompanied by a deposit of ten per cent of the amount subscribed, must be forwarded through the medium of a chartered bank. Any branch in Canada of any chartered bank will receive subscriptions and issue provisional receipts.

This loan is authorized under Act of the Parliament of Canada, and both principal and interest will be a charge upon the Consolidated Revenue Fund.

Forms of application may be obtained from any branch in Canada of any chartered bank and at the office of any Assistant Receiver General in Canada.
