Retiring From Service.
The resignation of Major Percy D. McAvity from the C. E. F. has been approved. Major McAvity suffered severe wounds at the front and still has a piece of steel in one of his lungs. He will take up munitions work at the McAvity plant, St. John. He was in Fredericton last week as presiding officer of a military board.

Ten Recruits Enlisted.
Ten recruits were enlisted here last week. The last two were Gordon A. Boyd, 18, Fredericton, and Douglas E. Allen, 18, Fredericton. Both join the 9th Siege Battery, which is raising a Fredericton section. Battery Sergt. Major J. H. McCollom is recruiting for the battery and will have an office in the Julius Inches building, on Queen street.

Sergt. Major Hanlon Returns.
Sergt. Major Jack Hanlon, of this city arrived here last night, having been invalided from England. Sergt. Major Hanlon enlisted with the 26th Battalion in the autumn of 1914, and fought in France with that corps. He was wounded severely and has not recovered entirely from the effects. He was in hospital in England for several months. His brother, Private Walter Hanlon, is now in France.

Suffocated in Fire.
The Dawson News of Feb. 23rd, in an account of the disastrous fire which recently visited Dawson, states that the late C. W. C. Tabor, formerly of Fredericton, lost his life when the Yukonia Hotel was burned. The deceased was last seen between 8 and 9 o'clock at night by John Laumeister, night porter of the hotel. It is believed that he retired to his room and was suffocated when the fire broke out.

C. T. A. Case Dismissed.
The case against a local young man charged with violation of the Canada Temperance Act was before the police court yesterday afternoon. Several witnesses were called and the cases attracted a number of spectators. Magistrate Limerick dismissed the case for want of evidence. He also made some caustic remarks on the laying of information in cases in which so little evidence exists.

Warden LeBlanc Pleaded.
Mr. A. T. LeBlanc, Warden of Westmorland county, is among the visitors to the city. The Warden took an active part in the recent provincial election, and is naturally very much pleased over the result. His brother, Mr. Arthur LeBlanc, was a successful candidate in Restigouche, and his home parish of Shediac, which he represents in the Westmorland Municipal Council, gave the Liberals a majority of 300. Warden LeBlanc expects to return home this evening.

Departure Prevented.
Owing to the regulation limiting the trans-Atlantic travel of women to nurses and others on military duty, the departure of Mr. J. D. Jago and his two daughters for England has been postponed. If the regulation is not altered it is possible that Mr. Jago will go alone. He recently was left a life-interest in property there by the death of an aunt. It is his intention, however, to continue to reside in Fredericton.

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LIEUT. J.A. WINSLOW SERIOUSLY ILL IN FRANCE WITH PNEUMONIA

Serving With a Divisional Ammunition Column--Left With First Contingent--Private John Doran In City.

Mr. J. J. F. Winslow yesterday received an official telegram from Ottawa informing him that his brother, Lieut. Jasper A. Winslow, was seriously ill with pneumonia at No. 22 Casualty Clearing Station, France. Mr. Winslow cabled Lord Beaverbrook, formerly Sir Max Aitken, for further information. The official casualty was confirmed by Lord Beaverbrook in an answering cable and further information promised.

Lieut. Winslow was serving with a Canadian Divisional Ammunition Column in France. The instructions of the official press censor forbid more definite information concerning the corps in which he was serving. He left Fredericton with the first infantry unit supplied by New Brunswick and after remaining in England for some time took an artillery course. Later he went to France with the artillery.

Pte. John Doran Here.
Private John Doran, who was wounded at the battle of the Somme in September, is in the city renewing old acquaintances. Private Doran, whose home is at Clarendon, is a former member of the Infantry School Corps in this city, having served with it in the early 90's. He also was a well known semi-professional ball player, having played with the Tartars of Fredericton, Roses of St. John, and other teams. He is a member of the N. B. Guides' Association. NO GRAND JURY SUMMONED, COUNTY COURT ADJOURNED

Will Sit Again on Thursday--Two Criminal Cases and One Civil Case to Come Before The Court.

The session of the York County Court, which opened this morning, Judge Wilson presiding, was postponed until Thursday on account of the absence of a grand jury. Two criminal cases are on the docket, making the calling of a grand jury necessary.

Mr. H. G. Fenety, clerk of the court, was not notified of this, however, until yesterday afternoon, when it was too late to summon a grand jury.

The cases to come before the court are as follows:

Criminal Docket.
The King, on the information of Wm. H. Finley, vs. Fred Brown. Clerk of the court appears for the Crown. Mr. G. T. Feeney for the defendant.

The like vs. the like. Counsel, the same.
Non-jury case--Annie M. A. Giles vs. Percy G. Gunn. Havelock Coy files record. C. D. Richards for the defendant.

Brown is charged with adultery and with harboring girls under the age of 18 years for immoral purposes. Both alleged offences took place in Fredericton.

The civil case is for money loaned. The plaintiff is a resident of Kingsclear and the defendant a resident of Sussex.

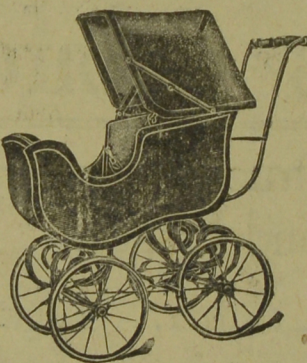

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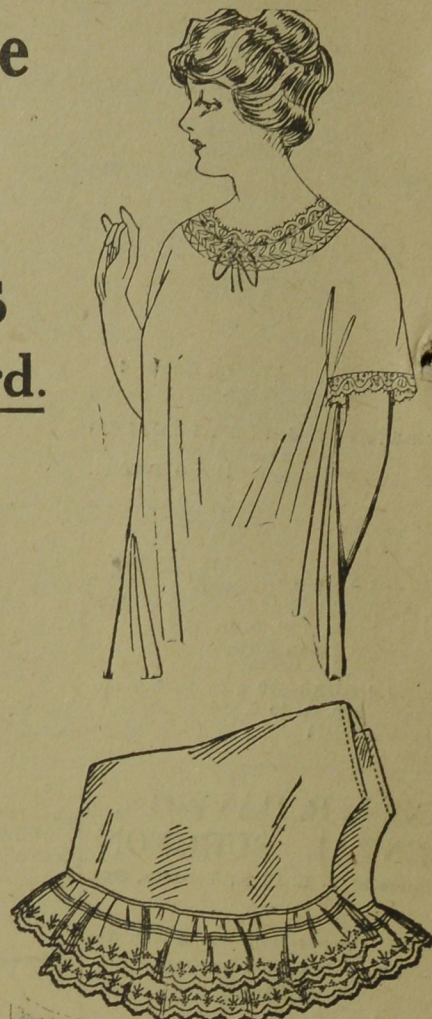
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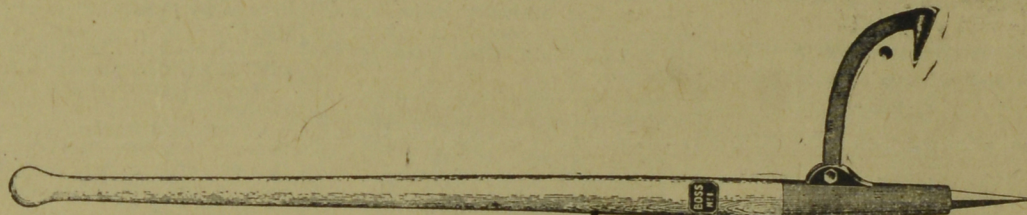


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
