OPPOSITION CANDIDATES SPOKE AT GIBSON MEETING

Campaign for Good Government Had a Successful Opening--The Issues Ably Discussed--Mr. N. W. Brown Addressed Big Meeting at Hayesville.

The Opposition party in York held its first campaign meetings in York county last night, when rousing meetings were held at Gibson and Hayesville.

At Gibson the meeting was held in the Temperance Hall with Mr. P. S. Watson as chairman. The speakers were Mayor Mitchell, Mr. G. F. Burden, ex-M. P. P., and Mr. Elwood Burt. Mr. Peter J. Hughes and Mr. A. B. Kitchen, three of the candidates. Coun. W. P. Lawson, the fourth candidate, was unable to be present. At Hayesville Mr. N. W. Brown was the chief speaker.

A meeting was also held in the Fredericton committee rooms, where Mr. F. H. Peters was the speaker.

At Gibson. There was a large audience in the Temperance Hall, Gibson. Noticeable in it were many electors whose feelings in former years were favorable to the administration, but who are now for the Opposition. All the speakers were given the best of attention and the audience remained until the end of the meeting, although that was not until 11 o'clock.

Mayor Mitchell was the first speaker and dealt in detail with the record of the government for the past nine years. He was followed by Mr. A. B. Kitchen, who made a particularly good impression with his reference to the Marysville dam and the efforts of the

Government party, which prevented it being rebuilt.

Mr. Elwood Burt was given a rousing reception. He dealt particularly with the Hazen policy of 1908, and discarded planks of his platform. The breaking of the pledge to let contracts to the lowest tenderer, the bungling in connection with school bonds and other instances of maladministration were touched upon by the speaker.

Mr. Peter J. Hughes, who is recognized as the St. Marys parish candidate, was given a hearty reception, many of his hearers remembering him as a boy living at St. Marys.

Mr. Hughes made a ringing speech in which he touched upon the record of scandals achieved by the government now on trial.

Mr. Geo. F. Burden, a veteran campaigner, who often has spoken at Gibson, was given an attentive hearing and made some telling points.

At Hayesville.

At Hayesville, in Stanley parish, there was a rousing meeting last night. Mr. James Boies was chairman. The principal speaker was Mr. N. W. Brown of Southampton. Mr. Brown was in excellent form and was given a hearty reception. He quoted extensively from the auditor's reports and showed up the broken pledges of the government in regard to economy.

Indications point to a big turnout in Stanley parish on the 24th.

OPPOSITION CANDIDATES IN NORTHUMBERLAND

Enthusiastic Convention Held at Chatham--Stewarts Flop the Subject For Jest.

Chatham, Feb. 12.--The fight for good government is on now in earnest in Northumberland. At the convention of the Opposition of the county held in the Palace Theatre, Chatham, this afternoon, it was decided to put a strong Opposition ticket in the field. The convention opened at three o'clock with the president, Hon. J. P. Burchill, in the chair.

An old campaigner said that it was the largest and best meeting ever held in the county.

The president opened the meeting with a few remarks on the object of the convention, and suggested that discussion be opened on the advisability of running a straight party ticket. He called upon W. S. Loggie, M. P., and W. B. Snowball to say a few words.

The convention decided that the politics of Northumberland county would be run on straight party lines, and that the Opposition ticket would be composed of four good straight party men. The delegates adjourned to the rooms below and shortly afterward brought in the following names as their selection:

D. V. Allain, Neguac.
Robert Murray, Chatham.
Thomas Parker, Doaktown.
Dr. McGrath, Newcastle.

The selection was immediately sanctioned by the convention amid great cheering.

Later, it was found that Mr. Parker was holding a Dominion Government contract and he was replaced on the ticket by David G. Schofield, of Blackville.

Mr. Murray in his speech made reference to the head of the government ticket here, J. L. Stewart, referring to his turnover. He compared him to the cow which gave the bucket of milk all right, but said he kicked over the bucket on Saturday and for the life of him he could not see how he was going to square himself with the electors of this county.

St. Stephen Curlers.

Four rinks of St. Stephen curlers arrived here at noon today. They are playing the Fredericton club this afternoon and evening.

To be Knight Commander of the most distinguished order of St. Michael and St. George, Albert Edward Kemp, Minister of Militia; William H. Hearst, Premier of Ontario.

To be Grand Commander of the most distinguished order of St. Michael and St. George, Capt. Edward Martin, superintendent of the Halifax dockyards.

To be Knight Bachelor, Justice Walter Cassels, of the Exchequer Court; Mortimer B. Davis, of Montreal.
