THE COOL STUFF.

Cheap and Easy to Make Your Own
Ice Cream.

Ice cream can be made at home for
less than half the cost of the commer-
cial article and freezers are to be had
in many sizes and at many prices—
reasons enough, it would seem, for an
immediate adventure in making frozen
desserts.

From 10 to 15 minutes is usually re-
quired for freezing, and the process is
certainly more comfortable than bak-
ing a pie. One part of salt and three
parts of crushed ice usually produces
good results. Turn the freezer slowly
at first and more rapidly near the fin-
ish. After draining off the brine, cover
the can with unsalted ice, and wrap
with newspapers and blankets.

Ice cream should "ripen" several
hours before serving.

Banana Ice Cream.

Pare and mash six ripe bananas.
Mix one quart of milk with half-pound
of sugar and stir until dissolved. Beat
in the banana pulp, add the juice of
half a lemon and freeze.

Plain Vanilla Ice Cream.

Beat four eggs thoroughly and mix

PROCLAMATION

By His Honor, Gilbert W. Ganong,
Lieutenant Governor of the Pro-
vince of New Brunswick.

WHEREAS, the fourth day of Aug-
ust, 1917, is the third anniver-
sary of the declaration of war by
Great Britain,

And Whereas, it has been proposed
by the Central Committee for National
Patriotic Organizations that public
meetings be held throughout the Em-
pire, on that date, at which the follow-
ing resolution should be passed:

"That on this the third anniversary
of the declaration of a righteous war,
this meeting of the citizens of.....
.....records its inflexible determina-
tion to continue to a victorious end
the struggle in maintenance of those
ideals of Liberty and Justice which
are the common and sacred cause of
the Allies."

And Whereas, the Executive Coun-
cil of this Province has passed an
Order-in-Council authorizing a Procla-
mation to issue requiring the assem-
bling of the people together on that
day for said purpose:

We therefore hereby request and en-
join that all loyal citizens throughout
the Province do meet on the said 4th
day of August and pass the said reso-
lution, and in view of the gravity of
situation and the solemnity of the oc-
casion, the day be also observed by
holding meetings of a religious and in-
tercessory character.

Given under my hand and seal at
Fredericton, the thirteenth day of July
in the year of our Lord one thousand
nine hundred and seventeen, and in
the eighth year of His Majesty's reign.
By command of the Lieutenant Gov-
ernor.

with one quart of milk, 4 heaping tea-
spoonfuls salt; cook in a double boiler
until mixture thickens, then freeze.
An excellent cream to serve with a
fruit or chocolate sauce.

Fruit Frappe.

Slice bananas, mix with shredded
pineapple, red raspberries, cherries,
sliced peaches or other fruit, and pack
in a freezer an hour before serving.
Pass with powdered sugar.

Raspberry Ice.

Boil 1½ cupfuls of sugar in three
cupfuls of water for ten minutes. Cool
and mix with three cupfuls strained
juice of red raspberries and two table
spoonfuls of lemon juice. Freeze.
Any fruit juice diluted and well sweet-
ened may be used for an ice. Lemon
juice should be added to bring out the
flavor of the fruit.

STRAW HAT CLEANER.

Dissolve one teaspoonful oxalic acid
crystals in one cupful boiling water
and after brushing the hat thoroughly
to remove all dust, lay it on a flat sur-
face and scrub with this solution,
using a small brush for the purpose.
Work rapidly, beginning with the
crown; rinse in cold water, wipe dry
and place on a flat cloth in the sun to
dry. Do not let the hat become thor-
oughly saturated with the water.

TO REMOVE PAINT ON CLOTH.

If paint is fresh, apply turpentine
and after the paint is out remove the
turpentine with gasoline. Do not work
near a fire with these dangerous oils.
Dry paint is difficult to remove and in-
variably leaves a spot.
