R. at St. Croix in February 1915 was sentenced by Judge Morton of the United States District Court at Boston Wednesday to eighteen months imprisonment in Atlanta penitentiary and a fine of \$1,000. Horn has spent two years and a quarter in jail having fought all indictments against him.

## To Meet in Fredericton

## War Veterans' Trip.

Major H. H. Smith, of the Discharge Depot, has been named by the European War Veterans' Association as the man whom they would like to lead them on their trip to Boston, and the Association will endeavor to have Major Smith take command of the contingent which will leave St. John Monday morning by boat for the New England metropolis. Captains Johnson and March and Lieut. McKinney will also be asked to go with the returned soldiers, of whom 56 have already signified their intention of going to the Hub. The soldiers will pay their own expenses. Major Smith is well known in Fredericton and addressed several recruiting meetings here after returning from France.

## Fire at Cossar Farm.

A serious fire occurred Wednesday at Lower Gagetown, on the Cossar farm for Scotch boys, when the lightning struck a barn and the flames spreading, another large barn was soon blazing. The house itself caught twice but both times the fire was extinguished by the aid of some workmen on the Valley Railway, who happened to be near at the time. Later in the day several automobiles full of men left Gagetown about four miles away, and motored down to help fight the fire. Both barns, which were very large ones, were burned to the ground, and the hay and grain and farm implements were lost. Fortunately no more damage was done. The loss will be quite large, and will probably run into several thousand dollars, covered by insurance.

BOARD OF HEALTH  
GUARDS AGAINST  
SMALLPOX

Sewerage and Water Extension, Improved Drainage Recommended—Milk Regulations.

The Fredericton Board of Health at its regular meeting last night took action in respect to any possible outbreak of smallpox in this city as a result of the cases reported at Lake George and Dumfries. The inspector was instructed to take any steps he might deem advisable without consulting the Board, as far as the quarantine of houses and the employment of guards were concerned.

## Inspectors Recommendations.

The report of the inspector stated that several cases of sickness had resulted from stagnant water lying on the Montgomery Campbell property near York street in the vicinity of the municipal home. He recommended that action be taken to remedy that state of affairs also that the surface sewer in Smythe street be extended and enlarged between the intersections of Aberdeen and Argyle streets and that water and sewerage be extended in the lower end of Aberdeen street. The Board will make representations to the City Council in the matter.

The condition of the public health in Fredericton during the past month has been excellent. Only one case of contagious nature was reported and there is now none.

## Milk Regulations.

The Board of Health is bound to enforce the regulations with regard to the sale of milk and proceedings will be taken against all dealers whose cans are not numbered and against all retailers whose wagons are not numbered.
