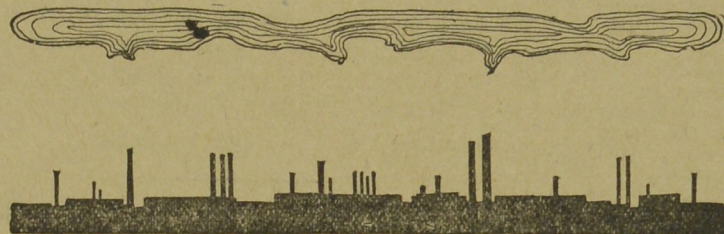

MORE TROOPS
SAFELY ACROSSOttawa, July 6.—It is officially an-
nounced through the chief press cen-
sor's office that the following troops
have arrived safely in England:Forestry unit, ex-Massachusetts, U.
S. A.; balance 230th Forestry Battal-
ion, from Brockville; forestry drafts
from Revelstoke, Calgary, Winnipeg,
Camp Borden, Kingston, Ottawa, Al-
dershot, N. S.; Army Medical Corps
drafts from Victoria, Winnipeg, Lon-
don, Camp Borden, Kingston, Valcar-
tier, Halifax; cycle platoons from Re-
gina and London; drafts of skilled
railway employes from Calgary, Otta-
wa and Montreal; Army Service Corps
drafts from Winnipeg, Camp Borden,
Toronto, Cobourg; a heavy artillery
draft, and siege artillery drafts from
Ottawa and Montreal (McGill Uni-
versity); 7th Brigade artillery draft
from Montreal; a machine gun draft
from St. John, N. B., and recruits for
Imperial army details. Total of all
ranks, 4,800.**FIRE LOSSES**
LAST MONTHToronto, July 6.—The Monetary
Times estimate of Canadian fire losses
during June is \$1,184,627, as compared
with May losses of \$1,163,110 and
\$494,557 for the corresponding month
of last year. The heaviest losses for
the month were caused by the destruc-
tion of the Regina Storage and For-
warding Company's plant on June 12,
with a loss of \$177,000, and by the fire
at Sorrel, Que., on June 19, in which
the loss is given at \$200,000.There were four other fires during
the month in which the loss was \$50,-
000 or over.
Nine deaths from fire occurred dur-
ing June, three of them in the burn-
