NEW PREMIER MEETS WITH HEARTY RECEPTION

that I hope the day is past when there will be any graft or such reckless expenditures in this department. I have every confidence in the new Minister of Public Works. He is energetic and practical and will meet the views of the people so far as the public interests are concerned.

"I know that I can say that with respect to every member of my government. I believe that Hon. Mr. Tweeddale, the Minister of Agriculture, is already meeting with some problems which no doubt he will acquaint you with himself, but I have every confidence also that he will be able to grapple with the difficulties that present themselves, and act always in the interests of the agriculturists of the province.

The Valley Railway.

"My government is going ahead with the construction of the Valley Railway, but I trust we are going to do it more honestly and economically than the work has been carried on in the past. I regret to inform you that so far my investigation into the affairs of the railway have not been very satisfactory. More money will have to be provided to complete the road, both from Gagetown to Westfield, and from Centreville to Andover. With another government in power at Ottawa and a renewal of the subsidy from Andover north, I hope the day will come when the government can make that long-promised connection with the Transcontinental which at the beginning was the principal object in view in constructing this important road.

The Country's Welfare First.

"I do not want to take up too much of your time upon matters which may be discussed more fully in the near future, and particularly in the Legislature. I am here rather for the purpose of meeting and greeting you, of making the acquaintance of those whom I hope will be my new constituents, than entering into a discussion of public affairs at any length. However, there is one point that I wish to make, the government of which I am Premier intends to give the people of this province a business administration. We are not going to place our own personal interests before the welfare of the country. We are going to take up each and every question upon its merits and not place legislation upon the statute books that will be for the benefit of private individuals and contrary to the public good.

"There is great natural wealth and many opportunities in this province of New Brunswick. We must not waste our resources. We must preserve the Crown Lands of our province; in fact we must guard very jealously every portion of our public domain. The ruined fields, the splintered forests of France and Belgium and Russia, impress the fact more strongly upon us of what great need there will be in the world for such natural wealth as exists in the province of New Brunswick."

A Bad Mess.

The Premier said that one of the first acts of the new government had been to raise \$100,000 to pay estimates and wages for work on that railway during February. That fact gave an indication of the condition of the railway's affairs. It was a bad mess, but the present government would see the matter through. To make the railway the least burden upon the people connection must be made with the Transcontinental line. The extension to Andover also must be considered. It might not be done at once, but would be as soon as possible.

Speaking of the returned soldiers, Premier Foster said that New Brunswick was the only province which had done nothing toward caring for those affected with tuberculosis. He was pleased to be able to announce that arrangements were being made by the new government to have such soldiers cared for in properly equipped institutions at River Glade and East St. John.

It had been said that it would be an honor for Victoria to be represented by the Premier of the province, but it really was an honor to the Premier to represent a constituency with such water powers, such agricultural lands and such other natural resources.

Must Economize.

"We must economize. The war for freedom which has assumed such tremendous proportions, the war in which so many thousands of our New Brunswick sons are engaged, has placed on the people of New Brunswick as well as upon the men and women of all portions of the empire, a responsibility for economy that cannot be ignored. Governments as well as individuals must respond to the demand that every bit of wealth and every resource that we have shall be treasured and guarded most carefully.

"Therefore it is that the new government will have a greater task before it than perhaps any administration in the history of our province. I feel so strongly upon this point that I think we should economize even in our public services.

"The loyal and patriotic men of the party in power should see to it that every dollar of public money is spent honestly and is spent well.

Premier Foster in conclusion promised his best attention to the interests of Victoria county.

Hon. Mr. Dugal followed, his remarks being in French.

Hon. Mr. Tweeddale

Hon. J. F. Tweeddale, Minister of Agriculture, thanked the electors for the magnificent vote given him and Mr. Burgess on pointblank the statement of certain that he and his colleagues had used an anti-con- scription canvass. At no time was

conscription mentioned. In having Hon. Mr. Foster come to Victoria to secure a seat the high honor had been given the county of. The Premier had selected Victoria out of a number of available constituencies. In Mr. Burgess the county had possessed a valuable representative who had done much for his constituency. His connection with the Blue Bell tract purchase was particularly creditable and it was regrettable that during the past nine years those lands had not been properly administered.

Hon. Mr. Tweeddale strongly criticized the policy of the late government with regard the Valley Railway. A connection with a trunk line was imperative if a burden of direct taxation to meet interest charges was to be avoided.

Mr. Carvell M. P.

E. B. Carvell, M. P., was given a rousing reception when called upon. He said he had no intention of making a lengthy speech. He did, however, wish to take the opportunity of dealing with a statement of Titus J. Carter to the effect that a man had said at Grand Falls that he (Carvell) had employed an anti-conscription canvass in the recent provincial elections. His information was that the statement never had been made at Grand Falls. So far as Mr. Carter was concerned, if he wished to follow up that line of conduct let him run in the by-election and he would lose his deposit. (Applause.)

Speaking of conditions discovered at Fredericton, he said that the people would be given some amazing information within the next few weeks which would show the conditions into which affairs had got in the past nine years.

Hon. Mr. Foster's government would begin office with an empty treasury, for it was a fact that but \$4,000 was left by the old government, and that was to pay salaries of the members.

The national anthem and cheers for the King, Premier Foster and Hon. Mr. Tweeddale concluded the meeting.

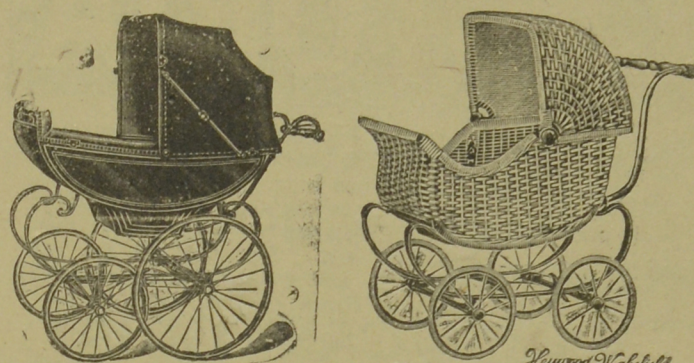

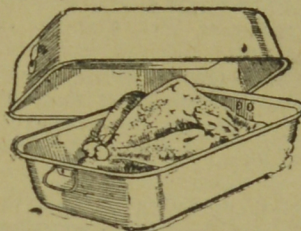
