ON MR. GERARD'S SPEECH President Wilson's Main Concern is To Have War End as Soon as Possible.

SOME PRESS COMMENT

London, Jan. 10 .- While the speech of James W. Gerard, the American am bassador to Germany, the German newspaper comment, and reports of the impression created by it in the United States, have been given and are still being given prominence in the London morning newspapers, none of them has commented on the speech until today, when the Daily Express alone prints an editorial.

After paying grateful tribute to Ambassador Gerard's efforts on behalf of British prisoners, the Dally Express says: "It is not for us to criticize the unconventional methods of American diplomats, and gratitude will preven any British criticism of Mr. Gerard himself. It is impossible to understand the attitude of America to the complex problems of the war, unless the many obsessions of the American mind care fully consider the factors governing the national opinion in the different parts of the United States.

In view of these conflicting factors it is easy to understand that President Wilson's main concern is to bring the war to an end as soon as possible, and thus remove the danger of American entanglement."

The newspaper adds that despite the narrow-visioned policy, enlightened opinion in the United States cannot expect the Allies, after two and a half years of bloody sacrifice, to agree to a peace which would make that sacrific




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
