### Banquet After Match.

The match was followed by the customary banquet, which was one of the most successful ever held at the rink. President W. S. Thomas was in the chair. The toast list included "The King," "The Governor General," "Britannia and Her Allies" and "The Young Curlers."

The feature of the banquet was the presentation to the club of a beautiful oil (.) painting depicting the Wee Neilly stream in Scotland, and "Wee Neilly," after whom the match and banquet is named, making the first granite curling stone in spite of the remonstrances of his father. Honorary President E. H. Allen gave an interesting account of "Wee Neilly" of Tobemora, which was so replete with details and corroborated in all particulars that it completely satisfied all who had the least tendency to scepticism except Rev. D. W. Roberts, who in a reply took issue with Mr. Allen on certain points. The club, however, refused to entertain any doubts.

A stone of gray granite made by "Wee Neilly" and brought to Fredericton by the late John Neill was displayed at the banquet. It was suitably engraved "Tobemora, C. C. 1786."

### Musical Numbers.

After the speech-making there were vocal solos by F. W. deMille, F. L. Cooper, D. L. Dolan and David Staples. There was also a banjo solo by Cecil D. Holder. Many choruses also were sung by those assembled.

Later in the proceedings Honorary President E. H. Allen was honored by a toast and the same was done to F. A. Dixon, a former member of the Sackville Curling Club, who has taken up his residence in Fredericton.

One of the features of the closing minutes of the banquet was a parade past the painting of "Wee Neilly" to which each gave the Curlers' Salute, as prescribed by the Honorary President.

## SOME PRESS COMMENT ON MR. GERARD'S SPEECH

President Wilson's Main Concern is  
To Have War End as Soon as  
Possible.

London, Jan. 10.—While the speech of James W. Gerard, the American ambassador to Germany, the German newspaper comment, and reports of the impression created by it in the United States, have been given and are still being given prominence in the London morning newspapers, none of them has commented on the speech until today, when the Daily Express alone prints an editorial.

After paying grateful tribute to Ambassador Gerard's efforts on behalf of British prisoners, the Daily Express says: "It is not for us to criticize the unconventional methods of American diplomats, and gratitude will prevent any British criticism of Mr. Gerard himself. It is impossible to understand the attitude of America to the complex problems of the war, unless the many obsessions of the American mind carefully consider the factors governing the national opinion in the different parts of the United States."

In view of these conflicting factors, it is easy to understand that President Wilson's main concern is to bring the war to an end as soon as possible, and thus remove the danger of American entanglement."

The newspaper adds that despite the narrow-visioned policy, enlightened opinion in the United States cannot expect the Allies, after two and a half years of bloody sacrifice, to agree to a peace which would make that sacrifice unavailing.

## MAY STOP BOOZE SHIPMENTS FROM QUEBEC

A Compromise Proposal Made by  
The Licence Victuallers'  
Association.

Montreal, Jan. 10.—If the views of the organized liquor interests of the province of Quebec are agreed to by the Federal government, shipping of liquor from this province to the other eight provinces which are "dry" will be prohibited. This was the compromise proposal made at a meeting yesterday of the licensed victuallers and allied trades.

The liquor men claim that a move to have Dominion prohibition would be unfavorable to Quebec. They recognize that every province has the right to control its own liquor traffic. Eight provinces have either gone "dry" or are about to do so. The province of Quebec, while rejecting prohibition, has enacted what the liquor people term is drastic legislation. They would agree to a law to stop shipments from this province to other provinces, where prohibitory laws are in effect, and they claim this should be satisfactory to the temperance people of the other provinces.
