## S. NEILL RE-ELECTED AS BOARD OF TRADE PRESIDENT

Annual Meeting Held Last Night--Activities of Board Curtailed During War--Technical Education Strongly Advocated--Tourist Committee Received Only \$500 Grant From Provincial Government.

The annual meeting of the Fredericton Board of Trade was held last night. Mr. James S. Neill was re-elected president. The reports were presented, and officers and executive elected. The report of the president, which is given in full elsewhere, was discussed section by section. In connection with that touching on technical education, the members expressed appreciation of the efforts of the school board and the hope was expressed that the province or the Dominion would assist in greater efforts along the same line.

Among those present were Ald. Jos. Walker, Ald. J. M. Lemont, G. Y. Dibblee, F. B. Edgecombe, C. F. Chestnut, R. B. Hanson, J. J. Weddall, J. T. Jennings, Ald. Reid, Geo. W. Hodge, J. D. Palmer, Mayor Mitchell, Dr. C. C. Jones, W. S. Hooper and A. R. Slipp.

**Treasurer's Report.**  
The treasurer, Ald. Lemont, reporting, stated that the membership was sixty-six. His statement of receipts was as follows:

A balance of \$253 was reported on hand, which would be increased to about \$500 by payments from the Tourist and Publicity Committees.

**Publicity Report.**  
Ald. Walker, treasurer of the Publicity Committee, reported that there had been little activity in this department. The total expenditure had been \$836.66, and there was a balance of \$198.60.

Secretary Simonds, for the same department, reported that on the suggestion of Agent General F. W. Sumner a large number of the industrial booklets had been forwarded to the New Brunswick office in London, England. During the year many inquiries had been received from foreign countries. It also was observed that the office of the Board of Trade was extensively used for the dissemination of information of various kinds.

**Tourist Department.**  
Mr. R. F. Randolph was not present, and Mr. J. T. Jennings reported for the Transportation Committee that no meetings had been held.

For the Tourist Committee Mr. C. F. Chestnut reported that no new work had been attempted in this department because there had been a shortage of \$500 in the grant from the Provincial Government. The customary grant was \$1,000 per year, but when \$500 was secured, the provincial authorities had requested that the balance be not drawn until required. When additional money was required it was refused on the ground that the vote had lapsed, and an advance was refused because it would be a bad precedent.

For the Canadian Club Dr. C. C. Jones reported that no meetings had been held during the year.

Mr. Jennings gave notice of motion that only members whose fees were paid could vote for members of the executive.

**Technical Education.**  
Discussion on the address of President Neill ensued. Several expressed opinion on the section relating to technical education. J. D. Palmer strongly favored evening classes in technical subjects.

G. Y. Dibblee said the question of technical education was too broad and too expensive for the city of Fredericton to undertake. The Dominion Government should be asked to take up the matter.

R. B. Hanson pointed out that education, by the British North America Act, was placed outside the scope of Dominion activity.

J. D. Palmer said the school board had no too ambitious schemes of technical education, but was proceeding modestly.

J. T. Jennings expected that the technical education of the school board would be of marked value and would produce a better class of citizens.

Mr. Dibblee said he was impressed with the value of domestic science instruction, but the question of technical education could be handled properly by no political division smaller than the province.

Dr. C. C. Jones spoke in praise of the efforts of the school board in the direction of technical education. He agreed with Mr. Dibblee that any technical system must be supported by the province or the Dominion.

J. J. Weddall mentioned the fact that an ungraded school had been established in the city.

A. R. Slipp, M. P. P., highly commended the Fredericton school board on its progress in this regard.

## PLAINTIFF OBTAINED VERDICT IN LAND SUIT.

Case of Shortill vs Williams Ended--  
Line Located by A. E. Hanson  
Accepted.

The case of Owen F. Shortill vs. Fred T. Williams, was concluded this afternoon, the verdict brought in by the jury being favorable to the plaintiff. Damages to the amount of \$46 were awarded the plaintiff for lumber cut, and the ownership of the land in dispute was decided to lie in him.

The Ramsay line, which marked the boundary between the two lots of land in dispute, was decided to be the line located by Mr. A. E. Hanson in December, 1915.

Argument of counsel was completed yesterday afternoon, and Judge Barry charged the jury, completing his address this morning. His Honor requested answers to twelve questions, and Mr. A. R. Slipp, K. C., counsel for the defendant, an answer to another. The jury came in about 12.30 this afternoon, and asked for further instruction, and again retired. A verdict was reached soon after two o'clock.

The case has been before the Circuit Court for ten days and has attracted much attention. It concerned the definition of the line between lots No. 8 and No. 9 on McLeod Hill, in the parish of Douglas. Five different surveys were made for the purpose of defining the line between the two lots, and that made by Mr. A. E. Hanson is the one which has been selected by the jury as correct.

## CANADIAN COLONEL SAW CAPTURED SUBMARINE

Was Told That One Hundred U Boats  
Had Been Brought Into Port.

London, Ont., Jan. 10.—Lieut. Col. McMullen, commander of the Oxford Battalion, who arrived from England last night, says that before leaving Liverpool a big German submarine was brought in, all of the crew being dead. He was told over one hundred undersea boats captured had been brought into a southern port.

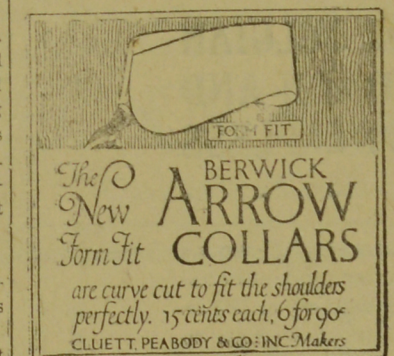
