JOSHUA DIDN'T STOP SUN; 'TAS ECLIPSE

Thus Princeton Professor Explains to
Presbyterian Clergy Biblical Tale
Which Strains Faith.

Philadelphia, March 16.—The Bible
does not say that the sun stood still,
but merely that it was "eclipsed," ac-
cording to Dr. Thomas Dick Wilson,
professor of the Hebrew language and
Hebrew literature, at the Princeton
Theological Seminary, the other day.

Dr. Wilson declared that, after care-
ful study of the words heretofore trans-
lated "stood still," he is convinced the
real meaning is "eclipsed" and that the
famous passage from Joshua, which
has caused so much controversy and
argument, should read: "Be eclipsed,
O sun in Gideon, and thou, moon, in the
valley of Ajalon. And the sun was
eclipsed and the moon stood until the
people were avenged. Is it not writ-
ten in the book of Jasher: And the sun
stood and hastened not to set as on
an ordinary (or finished) day."

"The lovers of the miraculous and
the critics of the Bible have united,"
said Dr. Wilson, "in maintaining a
translation and interpretation of the
passages in Joshua that are staggering
to faith. I feel now that when my stu-
dents come to me with doubts as to
whether God actually used the laws of
gravitation at the request of Joshua, I
can say: 'Don't worry. Nothing of the
kind took place. It was not a miracle
in a sense, perhaps, but it was certainly
a most providential coincidence, and
came like a direct answer to Joshua's
prayer.'"

SIDELIGHTS ON WAR LANDS

Clergyman Proposes Knitting During
Sermon Time—The Shyness of the
British Royal Family.

Miss Nesta Villiers-Stuart, daughter
of Lady Muir, Blair Drummond, Perth-
shire, is doing duty as a parlor maid in
a London hospital for soldiers.

Several of the most stately homes of
old England have been turned into
sleeping quarters for women making
amputations.

Knitting in church is suggested by
the Rev. A. M. Mitchell, a Church of
England clergyman, in his parish mag-
azine. "Better to knit for our soldiers

and sailors in sermon time," he says,
"than to talk and whisper, laugh and
giggle, flirt and misbehave, criticize
hats, gowns and fur coats. Those con-
stantly knitting learn to do so quite
mechanically and their attention is not
diverted from speech. Knitting in ser-
mon time would mean a great saving
of time.

As is generally known, the members
of the English royal family are curi-

generations. Upon this subject, a
writer in the Liverpool Post says: One
who knows the Queen well, tells me
that this tendency to shyness on the
part of her children worries her a good
deal. She considers that her own in-
ability to face the public fearlessly has
been a great drawback, causing her
often to look cold and grave and proud
when in reality she wished to smile
radiantly and could not screw up the
courage. I hear that Princess Mary
is being taught elocution in order that

part in public ceremonies and say

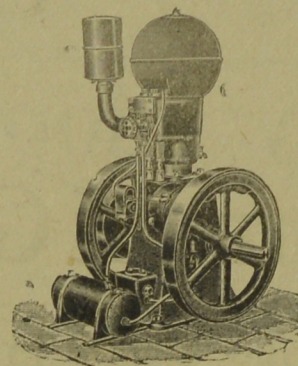

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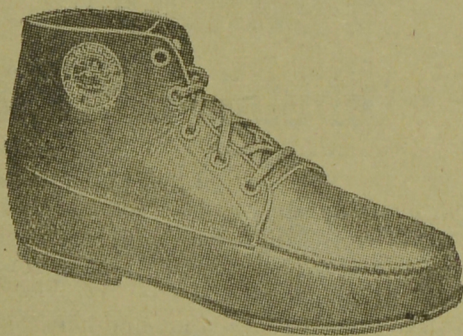
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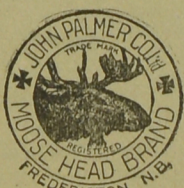
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
