LIBERAL GOVERNMENT NOW IN CONTROL

Determined on the Elimination of Czar Nicholas and Grand Duke Michael.

Petrograd, Thursday, March 15 (via London, March 16).—The old regime of conservatives has been supplanted by a government of Liberals. M. Kerenski, the new Minister of Justice, is a socialist. He accepted the portfolio on the stipulation that there would be absolute freedom of speech and of the press, and full political amnesty.

The cabinet has been chosen exclusively from present and past members of the Duma. It was named by the executive committee of the Duma in conjunction with other deputies and representatives of the workmen and the soldiers, which held an all-night session. Prof. Paul Milukoff, the new foreign minister, informed the Associated Press that the new regime was determined on the elimination of Emperor Nicholas, and the regency of Grand Duke Michael.

"We shall not change these demands," he said. "We shall have this, or fall. We can accept nothing less." The new cabinet contains the names of men who led in the struggle against the old government and enjoyed full confidence of the country.

According to the latest news, the Emperor is at Pskov, 162 miles southwest of Petrograd. Contrary to certain rumors, His Majesty has not been arrested. The Empress remains at the Tsarkoe Selo, where she is in perfect safety.

One General Shot.

London, March 16.—Telegraphing from Petrograd, the Times correspondent says that General de Knorring was ordered to report to the Duma, but refused to comply with the summons. On the contrary, he armed himself and the janitor of his house with revolvers and fired upon the guardsmen, killing two of them. The guardsmen then shot General De Knorring, whose body was dragged to the quay and thrown into the river.

OLD TORPEDO BOAT SUNK BY A MINE

London, March 16.—A British torpedo boat destroyer of an old type struck a mine in the English Channel yesterday and was sunk, says an official announcement made this afternoon. All the officers were rescued. One man was killed and 28 sailors are missing. It is presumed these men were drowned.



GRAND TRUNK PLACES EMBARGO ON FREIGHT

Montreal, March 16.—The Grand Trunk Railway this morning issued a notice that they had placed an embargo on all freight excepting fuel coal consigned to the company.

The notice reads: "On account of threatened strike of railroad employes in train service, effective at once, this company will decline to accept freight of any character from all stations and connections destined to points on or passing via its lines, except fuel coal consigned to this company. This embargo cancels all special authorities issued to date."

D. E. Galloway, assistant to the vice-president of the Grand Trunk, in a statement this morning, said: "If there is an absolute strike in the United States it will put the Canadian railways out of business inside of three days. This will be on account of their inability to obtain coal to run their plants, as they are absolutely dependent upon the United States for this commodity. I cannot but feel, however, that the government will step in and force the leaders of the brotherhood to avert a national calamity."

PLAY WITH EGGS INSTEAD OF MARBLES

Ancient Custom of "Picking Eggs" is in Full Bloom Among Philadelphia's Younger Sportsmen.

Philadelphia, March 16.—The annual egg-picking season is on in Philadelphia's younger speculative circles and mothers who believe in counting their chickens before they are hatched are keeping the ice-box door under lock and key. But mothers who have a streak of gambling blood in them are equipping their sons with eggs and sending them out into the wide, wide world to risk an egg on the chance of winning a dozen.

For now has begun the heady battle of skill known as "egg-picking," between all the youngsters in town who have any sporting instinct in them.

"Upper, upper! Who's got an egg?" is the cry that echoes along every street from Manayunk to Passyunk. The boy who first cries "Upper!" as another heaves in sight, gets first chance at tapping his egg from above on the egg held by the other boy. First the points of the eggs are tapped together, until one or the other breaks.

The total allotment of bonds of this issue will be limited to one hundred and fifty million dollars, exclusive of the amount (if any) paid for by the surrender of bonds as the equivalent of cash under the terms of the War Loan prospectus of 22nd November, 1915.

The instalments may be paid in full on the 16th day of April, 1917, or on any instalment due date thereafter, under discount at the rate of four per cent per annum. All payments are to be made to a chartered bank for the credit of the Minister of Finance. Failure to pay any instalment when due will render previous payments liable to forfeiture and the allotment to cancellation.

Subscriptions, accompanied by a deposit of ten per cent of the amount subscribed, must be forwarded through the medium of a chartered bank. Any branch in Canada of any chartered bank will receive subscriptions and issue provisional receipts.
