This good old soul's case is not unique. Many of us, if the truth be confessed, resemble him; we "low ourselves to be sold merchandise with an unknown brand or trade mark instead of buying merch dise which is well known to us through the mediu... of advertising. In slang language, we get "stung" pretty often.

In most of these cases we have ourselves to blame, for "the road to the right" thing to buy has been made plain by advertising.

There is no good reason for passing by the known thing, soundly guaranteed, to buy a dubious article, which, quality for quality, cannot be cheaper than the known, branded article.




