Mr. Blondin is known in Quebec as a fiery Nationalist and he achieved considerable notoriety during the campaign of 1911 by his anti-British uterances.

Speaking on one occasion at St. Louis de Blandford, Quebec, (on October 25th, 1910), the present Postmas ter General said
