EXPECTS TO FINISH WORK NEXT FALL

Head of Nova Scotia Construction Co., Discusses Valley Railway Matters.

(St. John Telegraph.)
"The Valley Railway will be completed and the trains running over it by September or October at the latest," said Thomas Cozzolino, president of the Nova Scotia Construction Company, the chief contractors, who was in the city yesterday.
When reminded of the Government's promise that the road would be in operation by February, he replied, "that is not what the contract calls for."
Mr. Cozzolino has been at his home in Sydney and is returning to the work. He was, therefore, unable to say what changes had taken place within the last week or so, but at the time of his last report there were more than 400 men at work and more men were available if needed—a marked change in the labor situation from last summer.
The winter work is confined to rock cutting and the big cut near Woodman's Point was progressing favorably when he last saw it. This is the biggest barrier in the way of finishing the roadbed and he expects that it will be completed by April.
The next problem may be in securing rails, but the road is being completed with railroad rails which the I. C. R. is supplying, and he does not expect any trouble in getting enough to finish the road. A shipment of eight cars arrived recently to fill immediate requirements.

Toronto, Jan. 9.—At a meeting of Liberals of Northwest Toronto tonight it was decided to oppose the election of Hon. W. D. McPherson, the new Provincial Secretary, in that riding.
J. C. Cane, wholesale lumber merchant of Toronto, and ex-president of the Commercial Travellers' Association, was selected as candidate. Mr. Cane accepted the nomination.

German Raider Reported Caught

New York, Jan. 10.—Persistent reports that a German raider was met in the Atlantic and sunk by a British cruiser yesterday afternoon were current today in well-informed steamship circles. Details are lacking, as is the identity of the vessels engaged and the location of the encounter.

PATRIOTIC FUND ASSESS- MENT VERY UNFAIR

Civic Authorities May Not Assess for The Amount Ordered by the Government.

The civic authorities have not yet been officially notified by the Provincial Government that Fredericton's apportionment of the Patriotic Fund has been increased from \$22,000 to \$25,000 and nothing about the matter is known except what has appeared in the newspapers. Mayor Mitchell represented the Council at the recent conference with the Government, but was given no intimation that an increased amount would be levied upon Fredericton. He stated this morning that he considered himself justified under the circumstances in advising the Council to assess the citizens for \$22,000, the amount first agreed upon.
The action of the Provincial Government in apportioning \$25,000 to Fredericton, while Moncton, a much larger city, is let off with \$16,000, is creating a lot of talk about the city. Many citizens look upon it as an unfair deal and think the City Council, before ordering the assessment, should make a strong protest to the Governor-in-Council. A legal man is said to have expressed the opinion that if he were acting for the city he would advise the Council not to pay one cent until a readjustment was made upon more equitable lines.
In connection with the Patriotic Fund apportionment it is interesting to note that Woodstock, with 4,000 population has been asked to pay only \$5,521.79.

Engineer Bowers. The action of the Water Committee was taken to secure harmony and efficiency among the members of the engineering staff. It was a question of dismissing one man or three, and we decided to dismiss one. If there still is lack of harmony, there will be more changes. About a month ago, after trouble developed at the Pumping Station, the suggestion of City Engineer McKnight that the Filtration Plant be separated from the Pumping Station in operation, was considered. Engineer Bowers was asked to take exclusive charge of the Filtration Plant, leaving the Pumping Station entirely to the other engineers. He replied to the proposition by a letter in which he said he would be 'chief engineer or nothing.' This made it impossible to separate the two plants."
