## KILTIES' FIELD DAY WAS A MAGNIFICENT SUCCESS

Crowds of people attended all parts of Entertainment  
---Festival Last Night Particular Financial Success  
---Demonstration of attack on trenches Interesting.

The Farewell Festival of the 236th Highland Battalion was the principal feature of the observation of the King's Birthday here. The morning was given over to athletic sports on the square of the Officers' Quarters. The afternoon saw a grand military tournament on the Exhibition grounds and the evening a fair on the Barrack Square.

Brewer was in charge of the team of twelve which gave a demonstration of bayonet fighting as the fourth number. The Musical Race was won by Piper Smith. Miss Myrtle Ross gave an excellent presentation of the sword dance which was followed by calisthenics by twenty men with Sergt. C. A. L. Waite in charge. The result of the Boot Race was 1st G. Harris, 2nd, Bugler McAleese, 3rd Piper Smith. Four pipers performed the Highland Fling. The tenth number was the most interesting. It showed a body of troops

making a raid on an enemy trench. The explosion of mines, the attack of the bombers, the assault and bayonet work all were shown. Capt. E. J. Mooney and Lieut. Frank H. Ryder with Lieut. D. G. Peters as signalling officer.

## BOSTON RECRUITS FOR 236TH MADE BIG HIT

ing memorial to His Honor:

Whereas, it has come to the knowledge of this Grand Jury of the County of York that many narrow escapes from fatal or serious accident have of late taken place because of the negligent and in many instances reckless driving of motor cars particularly in this city and on public holidays when there is a greater likelihood of serious results, and,

Whereas, there appears to be an increase of the speed at which the motors are operated and on increase of traffic, particularly in the number of motors,

This Grand Inquest of the County in session recommends that the authorities be urged to take more stringent measures to safeguard the public.
