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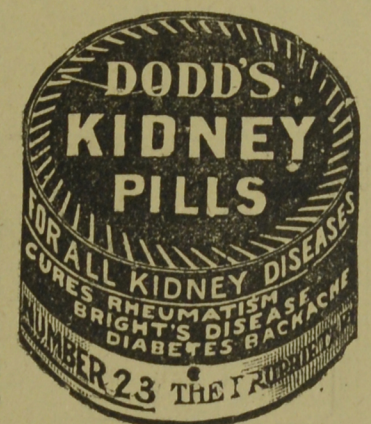

Scotch-Canadian, Who is
Well Known in Fred-
ericton.

Colonel Robert Smith Low — know
him? Perhaps not, but most people
in this part of the world know "Bob"
Low, so they know Colonel Robert
Smith Low even if they don't recog-
nize the name at once. Titles and
full names are often good disguises
even when they belong to you.In peace times Mr. Low was en-
gaged on many important contracts in
this part of Canada and elsewhere,
among them the foundations and
plant of the Dominion Iron and Steel
Company, the Intercolonial terminals
here, the Marconi station at Table
Head. In 1912 in association with
Bate, McMahon and Company, an Ot-
tawa company of which he is now a
member, he constructed the Con-
naught rifle range near Ottawa, the
largest in the world.When war came Sir Sam Hughes
sent for Low. "I want you to go
down to Valcartier and build a military
camp," said Sir Sam, or words to that
effect. "When can you start?"Out came Low's watch. "The train
goes in ten minutes," he said, and off
he went to Valcartier. He did a good
job at Valcartier, too, and ever
since then he has been engaged on
military construction work, building
Camp Hughes, Sewell Camp, Camp
Borden, and doing other work at Hal-
ifax. More recently he has been con-
structing barracks, hangars, etc. for
the Aviation Department of the Im-
perial Munitions Board. Early in the
war Sir Sam spoke up and changed
Mr. Low into Honorary Colonel Rob-
ert Smith Low, and Low deserved the
recognition, which is a good deal more
than can be said of most of the other
honorary colonels.Colonel Low was born in East Sag-
inaw, Michigan, of Scottish parentage,
and even at the risk of offending him
it may be said that he first saw East
Saginaw a little less than forty-three
years ago. Soon after his birth his
parents returned to Scotland and the
future contractor-colonel remained
there until 1886 when the family moved
out to the New World again, com-
ing to Halifax.Colonel Low began his work when
he was thirteen as a timekeeper in
his father's business at Halifax. Be-
tween 1889 and 1894 he was assistant-
superintendent of the business, and
from 1896 to 1899 he was superin-
tendent. In 1900 he became a part-
ner in the Sydney firm of McManus,
Low and McManus. Ten years later
the firm became the R. S. Low Con-
tracting Company, and then in 1912
the partnership with the Bate-Mc-
Mahon interests was formed.Colonel Low was married in 1900
to Miss Betha Miller Hearn, a daugh-
ter of the late J. H. Hearn, K. C. of
Sydney. He now resides at Ottawa.Col. Low has many friends in Fred-
ericton. While in business as a con-
tractor he laid the Hassam pavement
on Queen and Carleton streets in this
city and also the granolithic sidewalks
