The contract call-ed for the completion of the road from A VALUABLE Gagetown to Westfield by August 1st, 1917, but the time has been extended until December 31st, 1918. Authority was given to make a bond issue of one million dollars to complete the work, but against this there is something over half a million dollars in the hands of the Prudential Trust Company of Montreal, which with Federal subsidies will bring the total up to \$900,000. The government will borrow the money to complete the road and use the funds in the hands of the Trust Co. and the subsidies as a sinking fund.
