LAYING AGES OF HENS.

Result of Test at Maryland Experiment

The difference in laying quality in hens of different ages is shown in the result of a 3-year test at the Maryland Experiment Station with a floc kof 60 birds. During their first year these birds laid 857 dozen eggs and returned a profit of \$124. In their second year they laid only 745 dozen at a profit of \$96. Records for their third year showed only 576 dozen eggs and a profit of

The cost of keeping this flock was \$90 for each year, everything above that being pure gain. This clearly shows the great advantage in keeping he flock at maximum production.

Except for the work of gathering the eggs the non-layers requir ea much attention and approximately as much feed as the workers.
