## SIR OLIVER LODGE'S BOOK TELLS WHAT HEAVEN IS LIKE

**Has Been in Communication With Son  
Who Was Killed in Action---Book Tells  
How the Young Soldier Was Helped  
On the Other Side---Photographic Evi-  
dence is Added.**

Sir Oliver Lodge, in his book "Raymond, or Life and Death," just out in this country, gives new and remarkable examples of the evidence and memory of affection after death. Sir Oliver's reputation as a scientist and searcher into the psychic is world-wide. He was president of the Society for Psychical Research from 1901 to 1904 and of the British Association in 1913-14.

Sir Oliver occasioned a great stir in 1914 when he announced his conviction that a future existence is a certainty established "on definite scientific evidence."

In his new book Sir Oliver gives a remarkable evidential episode which "turned out to be exactly verifiable."

This episode involves information sent through mediums to Sir Oliver by his son Raymond concerning a group photograph of himself and brother officers at the front. Raymond was killed in battle in September, 1915.

### Helped on "Other Side."

Another feature of Sir Oliver's book is the part dealing with the extent to which friends of Sir Oliver helped Raymond "on the other side." Sir Oliver got word from his friend, the late Mr. Myers, by Mrs. Piper, a medium, of Greenfield, N. H., on Aug. 8, 1915, that a blow was about to fall. This blow proved to be the death of Raymond. Mr. Myers promised that he would soften that blow by rendering assistance.

In commenting on the "supernormal" section of his book, which includes the record of messages sent by Raymond through mediums, Sir Oliver says that "this part gives specimens of what at present are considered by most people unusual communications, though these again are in many respects of an ordinary type, and will be recognized as such by other bereaved persons who have had similar messages."

### Dealing With Things Beyond.

The supernormal section includes

three episodes, the first being the message from Myers about the blow to fall upon Sir Oliver, the second being communications bearing upon and supplementing this message, the third dealing with the group photograph.

"I now come," Sir Oliver says in introducing data concerning the photograph, "to a peculiarly good piece of evidence arising out of the sittings which from time to time we held during the autumn of 1915, namely, the mention and description of a group photograph taken near the front, of the existence of which we were in complete ignorance, but which was afterwards verified in a satisfactory and complete manner."

These are the circumstances: Raymond was killed on Sept. 14, 1915, near Ypres. The first reference to the photograph was made by Peters at M. F. A. L.'s first sitting with Peters in Mrs. Kennedy's house on Sept. 27, 1915. This was the reference made in the course of that anonymous sitting:

"You have several portraits of this boy. Before he went away you had got a good portrait of him—two, no, three. Two where he is alone and one where he is in a group of men. He is particular that I should tell you of this, in one you see his walking stick."

Sir Oliver did not know of the existence of the group photograph, and made inquiry concerning it. On Nov. 29 came the letter from Mrs. Cheves, a stranger to the Lodge family, mother of Capt. Cheves, telling of the photograph. Sir Oliver asked for a copy. It did not come at once, and in the course of other sittings it was described more fully by Raymond and his friends. These descriptions were verified when the photograph was received.

Eight days after hearing of Raymond's death, Sir Oliver had a sitting at his home for a friend with Mrs.

## HUNS HAVE BUILT A NEW ZEPPELIN

Geneva, via Paris, Jan. 11.—A new monster Zeppelin, the L-40, made its first trial flight over Friedrichshafen and Lake Constance yesterday. It is equipped with specially designed propellers which make virtually no noise. There is a machine on board the craft which, when put into operation, quickly covers the airship with smoke resembling a cloud, so that the aircraft cannot be seen from below. A gun of larger calibre than those previously used on Zeppelins is mounted on top of the L-40.

## CAR COMPANY PLANT WAS WELL INSURED

Montreal, Jan. 12.—F. A. Skelton, secretary of the Canadian Car & Foundry Co., said the destruction of the plant in New Jersey was the first mishap of any consequence which had occurred since the plant had been in operation. No information had been received, he said, to indicate that the conflagration was of incendiary origin. As regards insurance, he said, the plant was well protected, being covered against fire, explosion and loss of profits.

The Russian order for five million shells, he said, had been complete, and between three and a half to four million shells had been shipped, the balance being stored at the plant awaiting ships to take them to the places directed by the Russian government.

Mr. Skelton said that recently agents of the Russian government had been negotiating for the acquisition of the plant, but he could not say whether the deal had been consummated or not.

## ROUMANIAN PRISONERS OF WAR.

Large Number Taken by Germans to  
Northern France.

London, Jan. 12.—A considerable number of the Roumanian prisoners of war have been sent to the occupied part of northern France by the Germans, according to the Rhenish Westphaliaische Zeitung, as quoted in an Amsterdam despatch to Reuter's.

The paper says that these prisoners will be employed as agricultural laborers.
