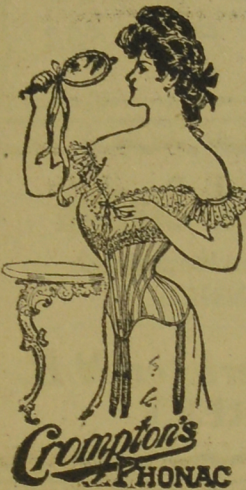

The bride's going away suit was of blue serge with beaver furs.

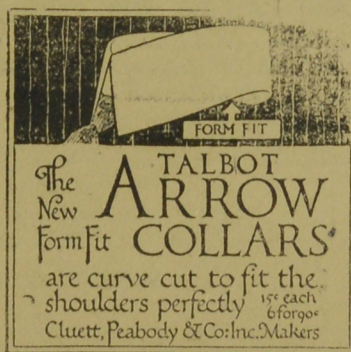
FRICTION AMONG MEMBERS OF PUMPING STATION STAFF

City Engineer Instructed to Investigate and to Report.

Friction among the members of the engineering staff of the Pumping Station, which has existed for some few months and caused considerable trouble, broke out again yesterday morning. The Chief Engineer and a subordinate were the principals. The matter was reported to Ald. Everett, the chairman of the Water Committee, who requested City Engineer McKnight to investigate the matter. It is probable that the Water Committee will discuss the matter at a meeting next week.

Ald. Everett stated today that steps would be taken to ensure better conditions and greater efficiency on the part of the staff at the Pumping Station. What the action will be is not known, but it is possible that there will be a separation of the Filtration Plant and Pumping Station, as suggested by City Engineer McKnight.

The suggestion made at the recent investigation that less alum be used has been followed, with the result that the Filtration Plant has since been showing a lower percentage of efficiency.

Ottawa, Jan. 4.—In response to several communications from the province of Quebec asking for advice as to the attitude to adopt in regard to the national registration cards, Sir Wilfrid Laurier has written strongly urging every citizen to fill in the required answers promptly and conscientiously.

To facilitate the filling in of National Service registration cards, Hon. Frank Cochrane, Minister of Railways, has authorized the distribution of circulars to the twelve thousand or more officers and employees of the Canadian Government Railways urging all officers and employees to fill in their answers correctly and promptly.

With regard to the two concluding questions relating to willingness to undertake other necessary war work, the circular says:

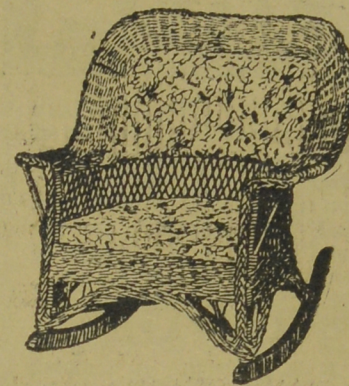
"The management will undertake to give leave of absence in cases where such is desirable and will undertake through the provident fund board to protect the standing of such officers and employees during the leave of absence period."

city of Moncton, with 11,345 population according to the last census, is required to raise only \$16,265.58, while Fredericton, with a population of 7,208, according to census figures, must raise \$25,000. Another astonishing feature is that York county, including Fredericton, with a population of 31,561, must raise \$63,402, while Westmorland, including Moncton, has an apportionment of \$56,723.61, although the population is 44,621.

Paris, Jan. 4.—A special Havas despatch from the British front in France says:

"General Sir Douglas Haig today commands the largest army Great Britain ever levied on her soil. The number of effectives in the British army in France on January 1 was nearly 2,000,000 men, completely trained and ready, day or night, to receive orders from their commander in chief.

"This figure only refers to the British forces in France, and is exclusive of those employed in the defence of Great Britain, Ireland, and India, or for operations in Saloniki, Egypt, Mesopotamia and Africa."
