

THE ISSUE CLEARLY DEFINED.

"I feel that the government, as it has been reconstructed, should appeal to the people for a mandate to continue the work of its immediate predecessors—a work which I think will commend itself to the public judgment."—Extract from Premier Murray's manifesto to the electors.

There you have the whole story in a nutshell. Do the people approve of the work of Mr. J. Kidd Flemming in his capacity of Premier of New Brunswick? If they do they should give Premier Murray and his colleagues a mandate to continue it. If they do not, they should kick out the whole outfit, bag and baggage.

SIR SAM CONDEMNS PETTICOAT INFLUENCE

Ottawa, Feb. 6.—The government's war administration was again in review today in parliament in connection with the discussion in the committee stage of the war appropriation. A large range of subjects was covered, including the Bruce report on the medical administration in Great Britain, the surplus of officers in England and local economy and inefficiency generally. The Bruce and Bapchie reports were discussed all afternoon, although neither report is yet officially before parliament.

In connection with this phase of the discussion, Major General Sir Sam Hughes came to the front with some characteristic criticism of social and "petticoat" influences in England, and he warmly championed the recommendations made by Col. Bruce. Sir Sam raised a storm of laughter by declaring the British V. A. D. hospitals had become known as "matrimonial bureaus" and many of these amateur nurses were now drawing the separation allowance of Canadian soldiers.

Some Strong Criticism.
W. M. German, of Welland, and D. McKenzie, and other Liberals, made vigorous attacks on the government for failing to deal vigorously with the waste of hundreds of thousands of dol-

lars in needlessly retaining in England thousands of officers who would never get to the front. They declared that the falling off in recruiting was due to the haphazard and lackadaisical policy of the government.

During a somewhat heated exchange of charges and counter charges as to justifiable and unjustifiable criticism of the war administration, E. M. MacDonald, of Pictou, read to the House a letter which he had received from a "fighting" colonel who had been overseas since 1914. The letter contained the following significant statement:

"IF THE PEOPLE OF CANADA 'KNEW WHAT GOES ON HERE IN 'THE WASTE OF PUBLIC MONEY 'THE CREATION OF JOBS FOR 'DISGRUNTLED POLITICIANS AND 'WIREPULLERS, IT WOULD MAKE 'VERY INTERESTING READING 'FOR THE CANADIAN PEOPLE; 'BUT OUR MOUTHS ARE CLOSED 'SO LONG AS WE WEAR UNIFORMS. IN THE OPINION OF 'MANY OFFICERS HERE THE LIFE 'BLOOD OF CANADA IS BEING EXPLOITED TO GLORIFY THE TORY PARTY, AND I BELIEVE THAT 'OPINION IS TRUE.'"

Shortly after midnight the war vote was unanimously carried.

THE QUESTION OF INTEREST.

For the fiscal year 1907, the last year of the old government, the amount paid for interest, as shown by the Auditor General's report, was \$178,569.70.

In the fiscal year ending October 31st, 1916, the interest charge, according to the Auditor General's statement, was \$351,004.99.

Increase in nine years under the present government, \$172,435.29, an average of \$19,159.47 per year, or at the rate of \$58 per day.

What do the electors think of this record for a government which went into power solemnly pledged to give the country an economical administration of affairs?

New York, Feb. 7.—There is no immediate prospect of cheaper paper, according to reports made today to the National Paper Trade Association and the American Publishers' Association, which are holding annual conventions here.

"The snow is hampering cutting in the pulp districts of Canada," said F. B. Moore, of Watertown, vice-president of the paper and pulp section. "And where wood is cut there are not enough cars to haul it out, and there is a great shortage of motive power on Canadian railroads. Everything that enters into paper has gone up."

CARD TO THE ELECTORS OF SUNBURY
