## TO BRING WITNESS FROM SING SING

New York, Feb. 23.—One of the most important witnesses before the Federal grand jury which meets here today to investigate alleged German spy plots, will be Robert Davis, who is serving a two years sentence in Sing Sing prison for larceny.

The United States District Attorney has obtained a writ of habeas corpus by means of which Davis will be brought from his cell to tell what he knows about Charles W. Wunnenberg and Albert A. Sander, under arrest on charges of conspiracy to obtain British war secrets for the German government.

Davis, according to the Federal authorities, has charged that the alleged spies received large quantities of mail brought over by seamen employed on neutral ships. He has also told of seeing letters that passed between supposed spies in this country and their connections in Europe, treated with chemical to bring out writing in sympathetic ink.

## NO SHORTAGE OF FUEL IN THE U. S.

Washington, Feb. 23.—No actual food or fuel shortage exists anywhere in the country and high prices should not be attributed to the present freight congestion, it was stated by the interstate commerce commission and the railroad authorities today. Reports indicated that all localities are supplied with adequate stocks of living necessities for immediate domestic consumption and the tie-up on the railroads will improve steadily.

## ENDS SPOILATION OF MANITOBA TREASURY

Winnipeg, Feb. 23.—The report of Judge Peterson, the Commissioner appointed last September to inquire into the expenditure for work done in the summer of 1914 on roads in the province, was presented in the Legislature today.

The Commissioner finds serious charges proven against Dr. D. H. McFadden, former member for Emerson; F. Y. Newton, present Conservative member for Roblin, and Dr. E. M. Simpson, now attached to the Canadian Expeditionary Force.

The report condemns the extreme looseness of even ordinary business precautions among the officials of the Government of 1914, and names a number of parties who obtained sums of money from the Treasury for work which was never done. It also refers to "the use made of Provincial funds which went directly into Dr. Simpson's hands, and so far as the Provincial Treasurer is concerned, are there yet."

Referring to F. Y. Newton, the report says:

"Newton, the candidate and central figure around which all these padded, raised, forged, fictitious payrolls and spoiliations of the public funds took place and to advance whose political campaign the \$24,930 was spent—over half of it wasted—shared directly in the booty. That very little importance can be placed upon the truthfulness of Mr. Newton's testimony is borne out by the evidence itself."

In reference to Dr. McFadden, the report says:

"That Dr. McFadden, at the time the Conservative candidate for Emerson, was not aware that men were padding the pay sheets and getting money in that way to assist his campaign, is inconceivable. Out of the pay sheets examined, over \$2,200 was misappropriated, and doubtless all of the defalcations were not revealed."

## IMMIGRATION OFFICIAL KILLED IN ACTION

Winnipeg, Feb. 23.—The Free Press this morning says word has been received at Immigration Hall of death of another former employee who fell while fighting for Germany.

He was Fritz Ogilvie, German interpreter at the Hall and later on bound-ary inspection work.

## BRITISH CARRY SOME TRENCHES AT SANNAIYAAT

London, Feb. 23.—The British forces operating against the Turks in the Tigris region of Mesopotamia have captured two lines of trenches near Sannaiyat, according to an official statement issued this evening. The statement says:

"Since the clearing of the Dahra bend of the Tigris all our efforts have been concentrated upon the taking of the Sannaiyat position on the left bank of the Tigris.

"There has been a systematic bombardment daily since the 17th, when our attack failed. All preparations were made for a new effort.

"This attack was continued Thursday, and two lines of trenches at the south end of the position were secured and consolidated. The fighting is still
