

## BRITISH FLAG FLOATED OVER INDEPENDENCE HALL

Philadelphia, May 4.—The British flag was unfurled from Independence Hall last night for the first time since the British redcoats occupied the city from September 1777 to June 18, 1778. The sight was so novel and inspiring that hundreds of citizens stopped and permitted their minds to reflect upon those momentous days when the British emblem last flew over the historic spot.

America's Old Glory, Great Britain's Union Jack and France's Tricolor were hoisted side by side over the front entrance of the Old State House. The banners were unfurled by Wilford Jordan, curator of Independence Hall, under instructions from City Hall.

## HOW TO GROW TURNIPS CARROTS AND RADISHES

(Boston Record.)

The roots of parsnip are dug late in the fall and stored in cellars or pits, much as cabbage is, or else allowed to remain where they are grown, and are up as required for use. The latter way is all right unless the ground freezes.

The seeds of parsnips should be sown now, if you have not already done so, in rows 18 inches apart. The plants should later be thinned to stand 3 in. apart in the row. A rich soil with frequent cultivation is necessary for success with this crop.

Carrots are cultivated in practically the same way as parsnips, but are not thinned so much and are allowed to grow almost as thickly as planted. The tender young carrots may be used during the summer. The remainder are dug in the autumn and stored in the same manner as turnips.

Radish seeds may be sown in the same row that you sow parsnips or carrots, as the latter are slow and the radishes come up in a few days, but mark the row so you can begin hoeing the parsnips and carrots before they are out of the ground. Radish seed should be scattered about 3 or 4 in. apart and should be pulled up as soon as large enough to eat.

## RELIEF STEAMER CONFISCATED.

Germans Placed Prize Crew on Board a Belgian Relief Ship.

London, May 4.—Confiscation by the Germans of the Belgian Relief steamer Carmetta is reported in a Central News despatch from Copenhagen. A Danish sailor who was a member of the crew, is authority for the report. He says the Germans ordered the crew to leave the ship and placed a prize crew on board to take her to a German port.

The men from the Carmetta, in two small boats, asked for provisions, but the Germans refused. After six days of terrible suffering the men in one of the boats reached the Norwegian coast.

## PRINCE OF WALES SEEKS COUSIN'S HAND

London, May 25.—Prince Edward Albert of Wales, heir apparent to the British throne, has answered for himself the question whom he will marry, according to the National News, a London weekly.

The News says the Prince has decided he will ask for the hand of his

first cousin, Princess Maud, the youngest daughter of the Princess Royal and sister to Princess Arthur of Connaught. The young princess is fourteen months older than the Prince, who is 22. She has lived a retired life, the inseparable companion of her mother. Her father, the Duke of Fife, was the closest personal friend of the late King Edward. The report of the National News contradicts the report current some time ago that the Prince sought the hand of Princess Yoland, eldest daughter of Victor Emmanue of Italy.

## STEAMER PONTIAC SUNK.

Probably Lost in the Mediterranean—Crew Saved.

Halifax, N. S., May. 4.—J. W. Carmichael & Co., New Glasgow, have received a cablegram advising them that the steamer Pontiac was reported sunk. Captain and crew were saved. The Pontiac was last reported as sailing on Saturday from Port Said, and it is probable that she was sunk in the Mediterranean. She was built at Glasgow in 1903. Was 2,072 tons net and 3,345 tons gross.
