see that the refrigerator is always

sweet smelling and scrupulously clean.
A good washing with soap and luke-
warm water, in which some washing
soda has been dissolved, once a week
will keep the ice chest in condition.
The drain pipes should be watched and
frequently flushed.When anything is spilled in the re-
frigerator it should be wiped off im-
mediately with a clean cloth. The
entire contents of the ice chest may
be contaminated by the presence of a
bit of putrid meat or a mouldy vege-
table.

Watch the Pantry.

The pantry also should be watched,
so that no vermin or insects may get
into the food, and flies should be the
particular foe of the housewife. Keep
the pantry cool and dry with fresh air
from outdoors freely circulating all
through.Flour and meal should be kept in a
cool dry place. Flour takes odors
readily and it should not be kept near
onions, fish, etc. Flour and meal ab-
sorb moisture and when moist they
decompose quickly, and vermin de-
velop.Butter is another food—as well as
milk—that absorbs odors easily. Both
butter and milk should be kept in
tight jars and never exposed to the
air in occupied rooms. Butter be-
comes rancid with long exposure to
air.

As to Meat.

Meat requires a dry, airy place; it
taints readily in a moist thick atmos-
phere. The habit many people follow
of putting meat directly on the ice in
its wrapping paper is a very bad one.
The juices are drawn out by the wa-
ter. It is not the ice but cold air that
checks decay.Never allow milk, cream, butter,
salad oil, or any food containing it to
stand for a minute in the sunlight.
Oils and fats of every kind should be
kept away from air and sunlight. The
chemical action of the sun's rays and
even long exposure to light is deleter-
ious and gives to fats a "sunburned"
taste.There is serious waste in many
households due to careless handling
of fresh vegetables. If the stalks are
cut and placed in water the vegeta-
bles will become fresh and crisp. The
whole vegetable should not be sub-
merged. The stalks draw up enough
water to keep them fresh and soaking
in water favors decomposition.Salad greens should be washed
thoroughly and wrapped in a clean,
damp cloth.Fruit also requires a dry, cool at-
mosphere. Fruit should always feel
dry to the touch.

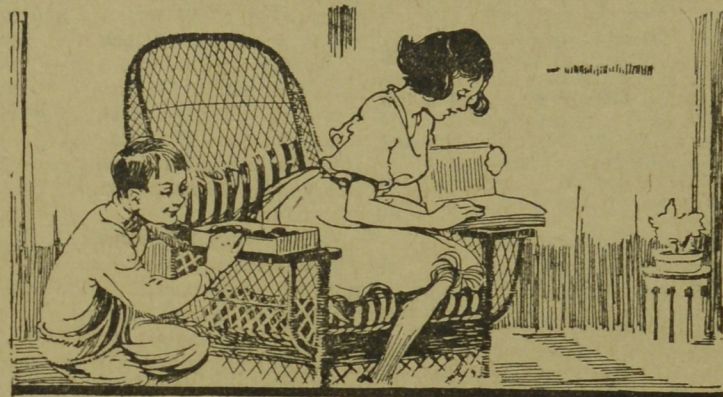
WORTH KNOWING.
