## THE POLITICAL POT IS BEGINNING TO BOIL

### Ottawa the Scene of Much Political Activity—Tory Politicians are Making a Desperate Effort to Get in out of the Rain—Sir George Loughheed Likely to Succeed Sir George Perley as Overseas War Minister

Ottawa, Oct. 4. — The buzzing political mill at the capital ground out today the formal dissolution of parliament, a new fusionist addition to the Borden government by the swearing in of Hugh Guthrie, Liberal M. P. for South Wellington as solicitor general and a new crop of rumors and speculation as to further prospective cabinet shifts and political appointments. Canada's long parliament would have died by the effluxion of time on Saturday at midnight but the government decided to end the lingering demise by the ceremony of a governor general's proclamation. As one of the cabinet ministers said today, another reason has been added for fixing Thanksgiving for Monday next.

The new solicitor general, Hon. Hugh Guthrie, arrived from Guelph this morning, saw Frank Carvell at the Chateau Laurier for a few minutes, and then hied away to Sir Robert Borden's office in the east block. Before noon he had taken the oath of office. He does not thereby become a member of the government, although later on in the expected shifting of portfolios he may be given a seat in the cabinet council.

The solicitor-generalship carries a salary of \$5,000 per year and does not demand continuous residence in the capital. Mr. Guthrie broke first with his former leader on the tariff issue, voting against the Oliver-Carvell tariff reduction amendment of last session. A little later on came his break with Sir Wilfrid on the conscription issue and his public criticism of the Liberal leader and support of Sir Robert Borden.

No Real Liberals Included. Commenting editorially today on the first tangible results of Sir Robert Borden's union government efforts the Ottawa Citizen says:

"Hon. C. Ballantyne, the new minister of public works, is no more a Liberal than are Sir Clifford Sifton, Sir William MacKenzie, Sir Edward Kemp or the other protectionists who are interested in buttressing the tariff. It is nonsense to claim that his inclusion in the cabinet is evidence that Sir Robert Borden is succeeding in forming a union government. The real Liberal leaders in the country are not found in the protectionist plutocracy of Montreal or Toronto but in the democratic atmosphere of western Canada."

Whether or not any of the real Liberal leaders of the west can be induced to "fuse" with the Borden administration depends largely on the results of the week-end conferences with the Western Liberals who will meet tomorrow and discuss with Sir Robert his further offers and plans. It will depend also to a considerable extent on the "reconstruction" developments within the Liberal party.

Sir Wilfrid returned this evening from Montreal and will doubtless be also in conference with Hon. J. A. Calder and the other western Liberals now foregrounding. It is quite possible that a decision as to union will be postponed until the Liberal leadership is definitely decided with its consequent bearing on the conscription issue, and the character of the coming election campaign.

Laurier Against Repeal.

It is certain that in any event so far as the Military Service Act is concerned, Sir Wilfrid will resist all pressure brought to bear upon him from a section of Quebec to declare himself for repeal of the act. He will use all his influence to secure its effective and harmonious enforcement and to secure the utmost possible win-the-war effort throughout his native province. As already announced Sir Wilfrid will not announce his plans until next week, after further consultation with his advisers and after considering the whole situation from the sole standpoint of duty and national service.

Scramble for Offices.

Secondary to the main issue of union government and the Liberal leadership there is a big scrambling for offices going on and a general shifting of cabinet positions under way. It is understood that Sir George Perley is to be relieved of his duties as overseas minister of war and to be formally appointed Canadian high commis-

sioner in London. Sir James Loughheed, the government leader in the senate, is slated for the overseas war post. Until after the elections at least the need of reorganization of the Canadian overseas administration has been pressed upon the government forcibly of late and Sir James is looked upon as the best man to tackle the job. If the government wins the election he will probably retain the position. His present post as government leader in the senate will, it is said, be taken by Sir George Foster who would like a safe seat for the remainder of his days and who, it is said, does not want to risk another election in North Toronto.

The unparalleled scramble of Conservative members of parliament or ex-members, as they now are, for safe jobs before the election storm with its uncertainties breaks, is hardly edifying or indicative of confidence in the return of the government. The latest appointment is that A. C. Boyce to fill a long vacant position on the board of railway commissioners at a salary of \$8,000 per year. The board as constituted calls for six members, but for the past eight or nine years five have been able to do the work.

Clarence Jamieson, Conservative member for Digby, has just been provided with a five thousand dollar job as a civil service commissioner, a partisan thus replacing a non-partisan. Dr. Adam Shortt, for whom a new position at the same salary was created.

For Hon. Dr. Roche another new position is being created, namely, chairman and additional member of the civil service commission.

Gerald Brabazon, Conservative member for Pontiac, has taken the position of inspector of storage dams on the Ottawa river. Frank Sheppard, Conservative member for Nanaimo, has been placed with the post of inspector of dredging in British Columbia. Three other Conservative members, Messrs. Blain, Fisher and MacDonnell, were recently given safe preferment in the senate. A half dozen others are expected to be similarly provided for before the government risks the election. They include Messrs. Barnard, Bradbury, Schaffner, R. B. Bennett and W. H. Bennett.
