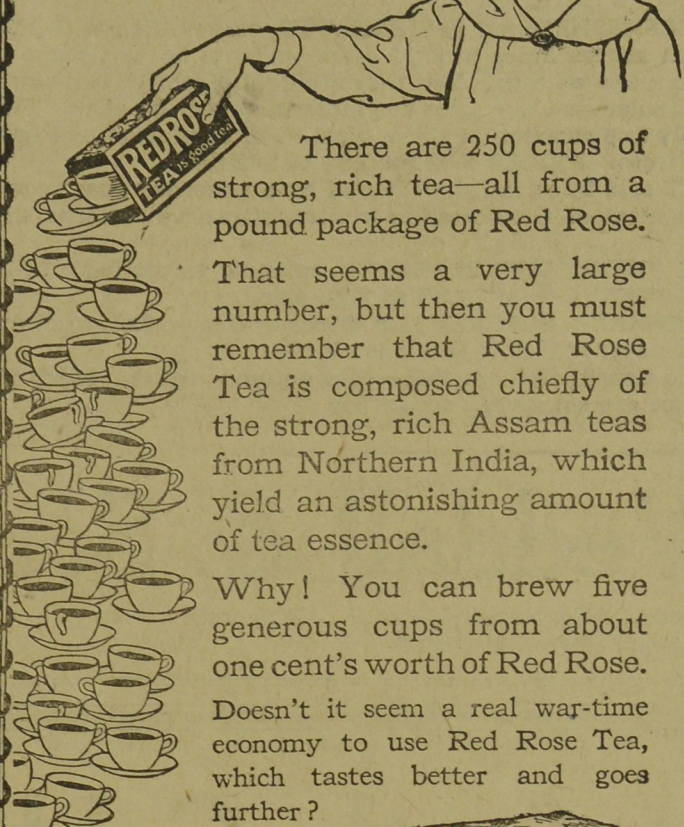

HOW N. B. MAN MET DEATH

The Late Douglas MacMonagle Belonged to a Well Known Kings County Family.

The following is from the San Francisco Herald:

Douglas MacMonagle, of San Francisco, a sergeant of the Lafayette Escadrille, met death in the clouds above Verdun Monday when his machine was shot down by a German airman.

Confirmation of his death was received yesterday in a cable from his mother, Mrs. Beverly MacMonagle, to Mrs. Frederick S. Moody, an aunt of the flyer.

"Douglas was killed in action," the cable read. "I am on my way to the front to the burial."

MacMonagle was thirty-five years old. He went to France two years ago as a member of the American ambulance. Following service in the Vosges, in the Norton sector, and at Verdun, he was awarded the Croix de Guerre for bravery in rescuing men under fire. Last December he entered the aviation service.

Much of MacMonagle's youth was spent in France. His father, the late Beverly MacMonagle, was a well known surgeon. He was a nephew of Mrs. Frederick S. Moody and Mrs. Claremont L. Best of Washington, D. C.

"When I went to Verdun in August of last year I tried hard to reach him, but failed," said Dr. F. W. Clappett, pastor of the Episcopal church, yesterday. "At Revigny, south of Verdun, I met five ambulance men who were enthusiastic of the splendid work being done by MacMonagle."

"It was at the close of this month that he was decorated with the Croix de Guerre for the rescue of the wounded under fire."

FITZSIMMONS SERIOUSLY ILL AT CHICAGO

Chicago, Oct. 18. — Robert Fitzsimmons, the former heavyweight champion, was taken to a hospital here today, seriously ill with what physicians believe threatens pneumonia.

The veteran of the ring, who is past his fifty-fifth birthday, was taken ill yesterday. He had been appearing in a vaudeville act at a suburban theatre. His condition became so alarming during the night that he was rushed to the hospital.

MISS BERTHA DILLON MAKES NEW RECORD

Sets a New Three-Year-Old Trot Mark at Atlanta—St. Frisco Beaten by Mabel Trask.

Atlanta, Oct. 18. — The setting of a new world's record for a three-year-old trotter by Miss Bertha Dillon and the defeat of St. Frisco by his old rival, Mabel Trask, featured the racing card today on the Lakewood track.

The new record was established in the second and final heat of the matron stake for three-year-olds, when Miss Dillon trotted the heat in 2:03 1/4. The purse was for \$5,851.50, the largest offered so far at the meeting. Harvest Gale and Worthy Volo divided second and third money. Mabel Trask won in the free-for-all pace against her old rival, St. Frisco. In the first heat, the chestnut mare won by a nose. In the second heat she broke badly on the last turn and St. Frisco cantered in. In the third heat St. Frisco took the lead at the start and maintained it until the last quarter, Mabel Trask winning by half a length.

The two-year-old trotting class went to Ruth Mainsheet. The 2:03 class trotting went five heats and was not finished. The race will be finished as the first event of the program Friday.

MUCH HAM WAS IMPORTED

Ottawa, Oct. 18. — In his annual report for the past year, Dr. F. Torrance, director general for the Dominion, shows that the Maritime Provinces were clear of glanders among the horses. There was a total of 241 animals suffering from the disease which were killed. Of this number Saskatchewan contributed 109. The total number of cases reported, Dr. Torrance says, is a gratifying reduction compared with former years.

The report noted especially the demands of the war. Canadian packers during the fiscal year were forced to import from the United States into inspected establishments, 350,000 carcasses as well as twenty million pounds of hams. This immense importation of meats from the United States, after being given a Canadian cure, was sold at a price second only to the best English or Irish cures.

WILL NOT ENTER UNION CABINET

Premier Murray of Nova Scotia Has Declined Sir Robert Borden's Offer.

Halifax, Oct. 18.—Premier Murray, when seen by the Canadian Press representative at the Halifax Hotel tonight, confirmed the announcement from Ottawa that he had declined to accept a portfolio in the union government. When asked if he would state his reason for declining to accept a portfolio the Premier declared that he had no statement to make.

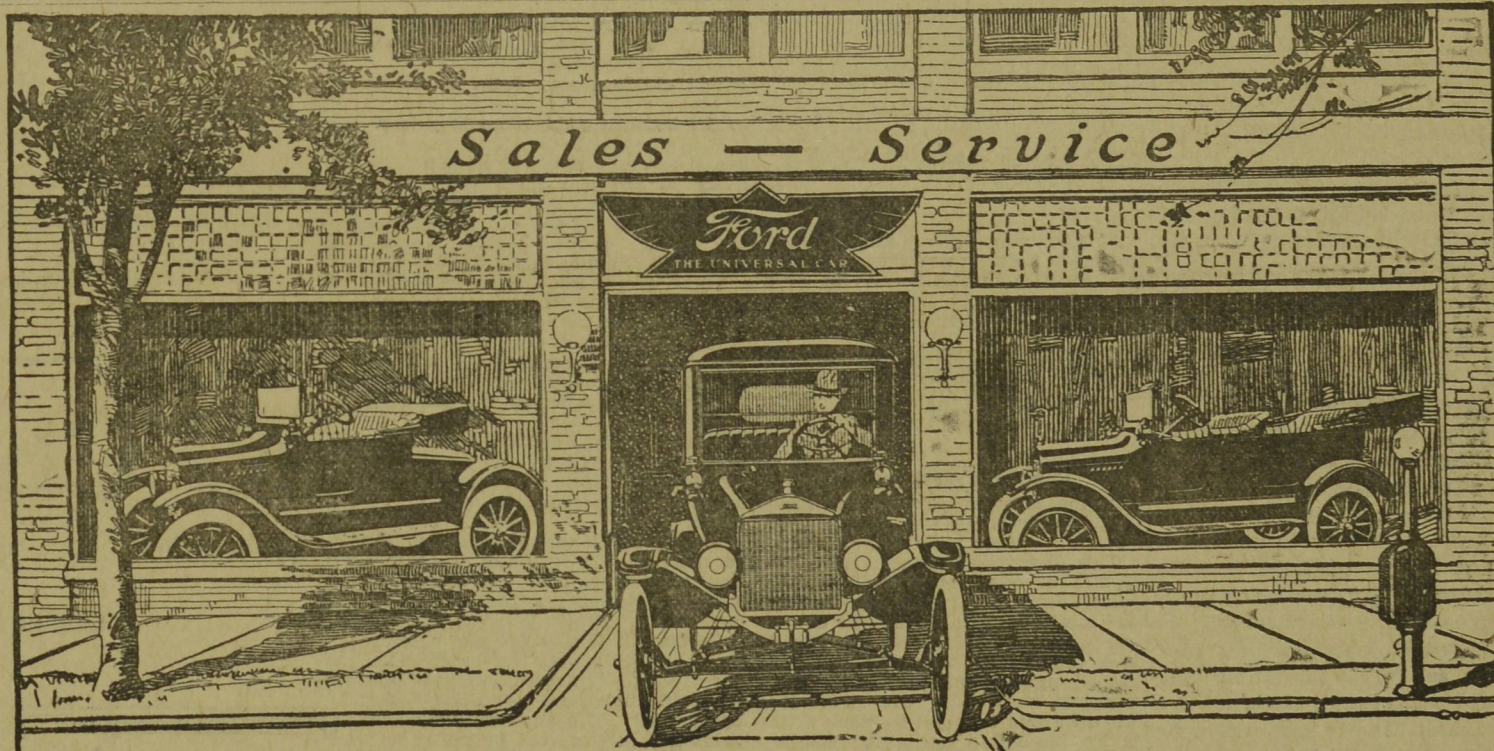
Ottawa, Oct. 18.—It is officially announced that word was received by the Prime Minister this afternoon from Premier Murray of Nova Scotia, definitely declining to enter the union government. The reasons for Premier Murray's action will, doubtless, be announced by him at Halifax, but in the meanwhile little is known here as to the reasons for his decision. As to what will now be done by the Prime Minister in regard to a Liberal representation from Nova Scotia is uncertain. There is a suggestion that either Hon. W. S. Fielding or A. K. Maclean will take the place reserved for Premier Murray, but probably no decision will be reached until Hon. F. B. Carvell returns to the capital tomorrow morning. Sir Robert Borden naturally wishes to consult him in regard to filling up the Maritime Province Liberal representation.

Government Platform. A twelve plank platform enunciating progressive and constructive principles of legislation, both for war and domestic needs, was issued tonight by Sir Robert Borden, the head of the new union government. It contains the first fruits of the principle of union and of the infusion of Liberal blood into a former Conservative administration.

A united front and service before party are the watchwords given by the Prime Minister. In appealing for public support for the platform enunciated, he notes that all elements are to be represented in the administration, and declares that a special representative of labor will be taken into the government, thus completing, as far as possible under existing conditions, a real union.
