VON LUXBURG SPIRITED OUT OF ARGENTINA

Buenos Ayres, Oct. 6.—Confirmation has been received that Von Luxburg, former German Minister to Argentina, who recently was given his passports for his connection with despatches sent through the Swedish legation to Germany, was spirited out of Argentina yesterday morning in a police automobile in charge of a police captain, and rushed to Tigra, a suburb, where the former minister took a tug to Clonja, Uruguay. From there he proceeded by train to Montevideo, where he boarded a Spanish steamer. He is said to have a Spanish safe conduct which, according to diplomats, is sufficient to protect his person, but not his papers, from capture. The steamer sailed later for Spain.

SOME HEAVY FIGHTING ON THE RUSSIAN NORTHWESTERN FRONT

PETROGRAD, Oct. 8.—Intensive operations have been in progress on the Russian front, both sides participating in them. The official statement says:

"On the front north of the Pskoff high road and the Hauske Farm, after heavy artillery preparations, waves of enemy scouting parties appeared. They were repulsed by our fire. The enemy several times opened a mine-thrower fire on our position west of Engelhard."

"On the western front there were fusilades and artillery duels above the city in the region of Lake Vishenskolkki and northeast of Baronovich. On Friday, in the Roumanian region our airmen bombarded the village of Mikloch and the Palanka station. They set fire to a magazine, which exploded."

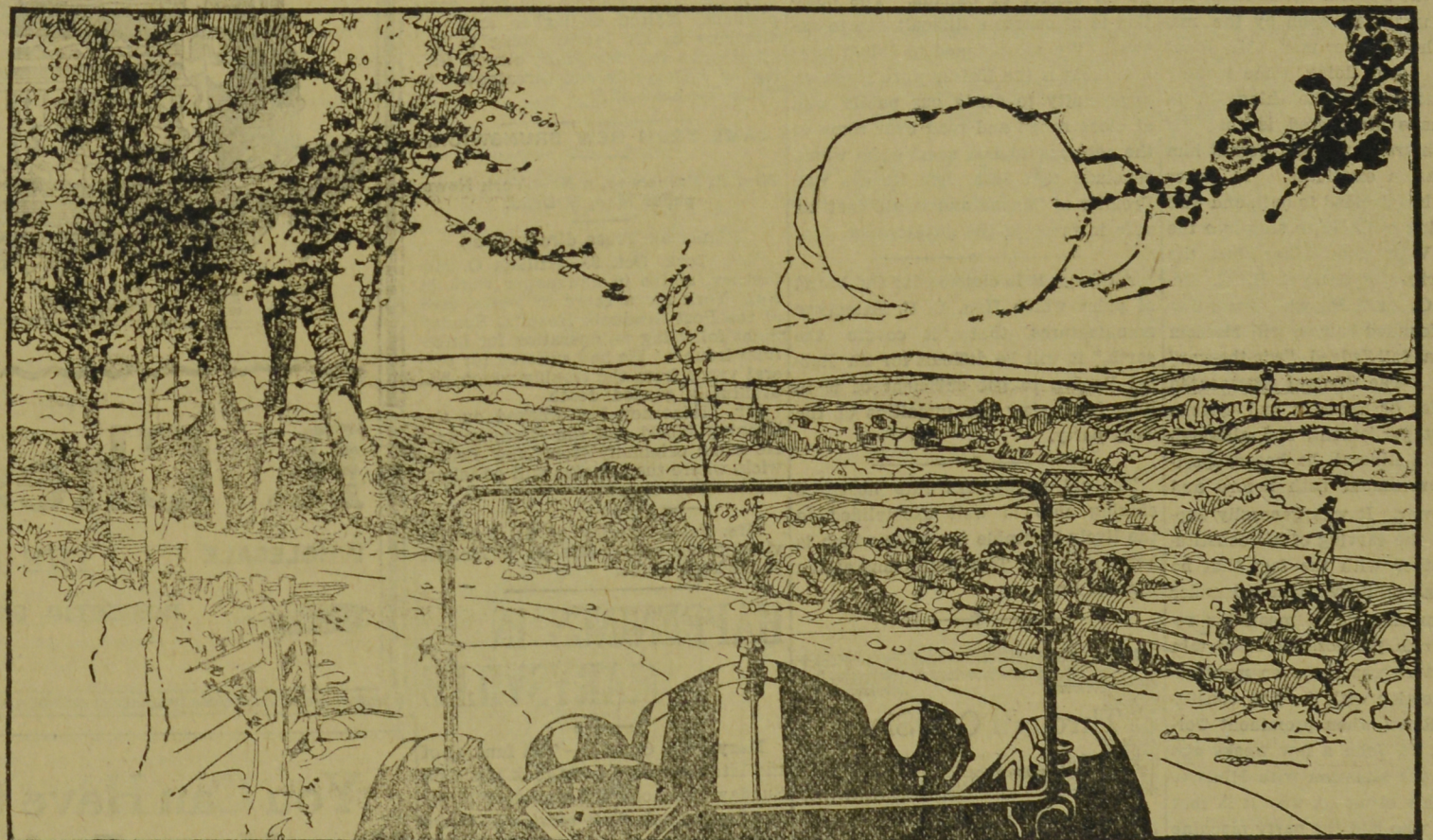
