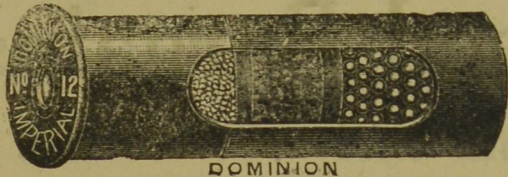

STILL NEGOTIATING FOR A UNION GOVERNMENT

Eastern Liberals to Be Represented Before Any Real Scheme Can Be Carried Through--Westerners Want a Say in the Appointment of Returning Officers --The Tariff Question also Looming up --Sir Wilfrid Laurier's Position

Ottawa, Oct. 8. — Union government was not consummated today. It will probably not be consummated at all unless it is to be a real union government with Liberals in eastern Canada adequately represented as well as western Liberalism on a basis of "fifty-fifty" for all of Canada, nor is it likely to be consummated if the situation insofar as the western Liberal leaders are concerned is clarified by the elimination, to some extent, at least, of the anti-Quebec prejudice unjustly founded on the Dominion leadership of Sir Wilfrid Laurier. If the latter, moved by the sincere desire to avoid deliberate Tory misrepresentation of his party's attitude in response, to win-the-war effort and to avoid making anti-Quebec feeling a dominant issue in the campaign, should decide that his faith of duty lay in stepping aside for an English-speaking Liberal leader rather than in continuing in his present commanding position of influence against the Quebec Nationalists and for the fundamental principles of Liberalism than the western Liberals are likely to withdraw at once from the present negotiations.

That is the outstanding development of today's conference of Premier Sifton, Hon. J. A. Calder and T. A. Crerar with Premier Borden and Hon. Arthur Meighen. The whole question was canvassed for several hours at this afternoon's meeting. The proposals of the western men for real union government with representative Liberal leaders from eastern Canada included in the reconstructed cabinet as well as the western Liberals, were, it is understood, not very cordially received by Sir Robert or Mr. Meighen nor were they very cordial to the suggestion that if the westerners entered the administration they should be given a voice corresponding to their numbers in regard to deciding in the appointment of returning officers and enumerators for the west under the provision of the war time elections act. Questions of the allotment of portfolios, the tariff issue, the control of national resources and general war administration were also discussed, but as far as can be learned tonight no agreements were reached. The negotiations will be continued tomorrow but no one can at this moment forecast the outcome.

The parties in the conference probably do not themselves tonight know whether tomorrow will see a final getting-together or a breaking off of negotiations.

Conservatives Cooling Off.

On the government side there is apparently a growing disposition to re-

fuse the westerners' requests for a larger measure of union government than was contemplated in the original plans for bringing in only a "few" Liberals but not enough to jeopardize any real control of the situation by the "party in power." The straight party men are bringing pressure on Premier Borden to call off the negotiations. Hon. Arthur Meighen is himself said to be throwing cold water on the whole proposition since he does not wish to be overshadowed in his capacity as chief western minister, nor does he want to give up any of the party advantage planned for the provisions of the war time election act.

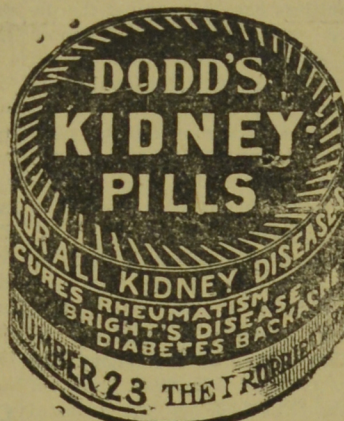
The government forces want to be sure that the union government would be one in which the Conservatives will have the deciding voice. Also they want to guard carefully against any possibility of another "Trojan horse" episode with the Liberals getting control of things from the inside after an election on the union government basis. The final "show down" is expected tomorrow. If the present negotiations make headway certain Ontario and Maritime Province Liberals will be suggested for inclusion in the government. If an impasse is reached Sir Robert Borden will proceed to invite the "second choices" to combine forces with him.
