MINISTER OF PUBLIC WORKS MAY NOT BE OPPOSED

Strong Feeling in His Favor Throughout Carleton and Victoria Counties---Joint Conference Held at Andover---Liberals of Moncton Declare for Sir Wilfrid Laurier---Mr. Copp's Nomination Endorsed---Sir Wilfrid to Run in Ottawa.

Woodstock, Nov. 6. — Hon. F. B. Carvell, minister of public works, arrived home today from Ottawa by way of Edmundston, Grand Falls and Andover. He spent yesterday meeting delegations of the electors, both Liberal and Conservative at the different large centres and received a most cordial reception from both parties. Mr. Carvell took advantage of these opportunities to state his position as a member of the union government and explain the urgent necessity for its formation.

The numerous assurances of support he received from prominent leaders of both parties were most satisfactory.

Last evening at Andover after a meeting of representative groups of Liberals and Conservatives there was a joint gathering and many leading Conservatives including Titus J. Carter, K. C., were emphatic in their support of union government, and Hon. Mr. Carvell as the unionist minister from New Brunswick.

Mr. Carter said he had telegraphed his congratulations to Mr. Carvell when he made his speech upon the military service act, and he reviewed the assurances he gave at that time. There is a strong feeling among prominent Conservatives throughout Carleton county that there should be no opposition to the minister's return.

In Westmorland.

Moncton, Nov. 6. — The Moncton city Liberal executive met last night. There was a very large attendance. A. B. Copp, the Liberal candidate for the county, addressed those present on the political situation. Every member of the executive also spoke and without a single exception they declared their strong appreciation of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's manifesto and decided to loyally stand by him as Liberal leader.

A resolution was unanimously adopted, moved by J. T. Hawke, proprietor of the Moncton Transcript, seconded by Hon. C. W. Robinson, M. P., a member of the provincial government, expressing the Moncton Liberal executive's high appreciation and endorsement of Sir Wilfrid Laurier's manifesto and pledging loyal support to him as leader of the Liberal party. Hearty cheers greeted the adoption of the resolution.

It was moved by Hon. F. J. Sweeney M. P., an ex-surveyor general, seconded by J. T. Hawke, that the Liberal executive endorse the nomination of A. B. Copp as Liberal candidate which was made a year or so ago as a straight Liberal candidate and pledged themselves to co-operate to secure his election.

Both motions were carried unanimously. Quebec, Nov. 6. — Lucien Cannon, ex-M. L. A., and former candidate against Hon. Mr. Seigney, was this afternoon nominated as the Liberal candidate in the riding of Dorchester. He was the unanimous choice of the delegation.

To Run in Ottawa.

Ottawa, Nov. 6. — Sir Wilfrid Laurier will offer in Ottawa for election in the coming contest. There have been some differences among the French Liberals at the capital and this course is accepted as a solution. As his English ally Sir Wilfrid will

Will Support Laurier.

Caradoc, Ont., Nov. 7. — At a big meeting here last night a resolution was unanimously passed supporting the manifesto of Sir Wilfrid Laurier and urging all Liberals to take immediate steps to place candidates in the field pledged to support his policy.

In the Field to Stay.

Kingston, Ont., Nov. 7. — Dr. J. W. Edwards announces that he has no intention of resigning as Conservative candidate for Frontenac, in order to allow his constituents to meet and nominate a Union candidate. He is in the field to stay, he says.

Liberal Convention.

Montreal, Nov. 7. — Dr. Theodore Gervais, of Berthierville, Que., was nominated yesterday at a Liberal convention as the party candidate for Berthier.

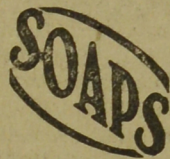
